RURAL G. W. V. A.
OPPOSES GRANT

Provincial Secretary W. E. Turley, G.W.V.A., for Ontario, in the course of a stirring address before Central G.W.V.A. last night made it clear that no matter what Toronto branches of the association might decide to do with the Calgary resolution to urge the government to grant returned men gratuities ranging from \$2000 to \$1000, the rural branches were opposed to it almost to a man. Indications last night were that the central branch would also oppose the proposed grant. The meeting practically adopted all Secretary Turley's recommendations, and as a result authorized their delegates to oppose any sort of political action or affiliation with political parties. He expressed the opinion that the man who was allied to a political party would lose his independence of political thought, and that the man who became an independent political unit would be either ostracized or smashed up, and that the organization which held aloof from direct political activities could swing all manner of votes into the desired line, thus the welfare of returned soldiers generally, provided it was worthy of the support of the best average returned soldier, was the only basis for the argument and moved a resolution in accord with that ideal. Central G.W.V.A. will, therefore, vote against political action at the coming provincial convention.

SCARBORO ENERGETIC.

A large meeting was held last night in St. Nicholas' Church under the auspices of the Scarboro branch of the G. W. V. A. It was decided to launch an energetic campaign next week to raise funds for the building of two clubhouses in the township. One will be situated in the northern part of the township, the other in the southern part of the municipality. A large committee was appointed to conduct the campaign in all parts of the township. This drive will run at the same time as the city campaign. Thos. H. P. Harper was elected president of the branch in place of J. H. Chalacombe, who has been forced to resign for business reasons.

BUILDING TRADE WILL
BACK UP PAINTERS

It was decided last night at a meeting of the Building Trades League that the league would stand four-square behind the painters and decorators in their strike against the master painters. This means that if the master painters refuse to accede to the advice of the joint industrial council to effect a compromise with the men nearly 20 labor unions engaged in the allied building trades will go out in sympathy with the painters. Central G.W.V.A. also at its meeting held last night at Columbus Hall decided to support the cause of the hundred returned men involved in the strike.

BRITAIN SUFFERS
FROM SEVERE STORM

London, April 28.—Following a period of perfect spring weather, one of the worst storms in some time raged over the British Isles last night, covering the country with rain from four to six inches of snow. Telegraph and telephone lines suffered severely, and communication is cut off in many directions from this city. Communication with the continent is interrupted. In this city, which received the brunt of the storm, 5000 telephones were put out of service. Spring crops and young lambs suffered from the storm. Marine reports show that a few small ships were wrecked.

BRITISH NAVAL TUG
SUNK OFF NIEUPORT

Brussels, April 28.—The British naval tug Huguette sank off Nieuport today. Twenty-two of the crew were drowned and ten rescued.

The Huguette was carrying explosives for clearing the Ostend channel.
