Buffalo, Nov. 2.—The Pan-American Exposition ended at 10 o'clock today. At midnight President John G. Milburn presided at an electric ball and the lights in the new famous electric tower were dim for the last time. Slowly, one by one, the lights on post and pinnacle and tower faded away. A corps of buglers standing in the tower sounded "To the Colors" and the electric illumination, passed away, and the Exposition was ended. 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PROBABLY FATALLY SCALDED.

Canadian Sailor Receives Frightful Injuries on Northeastern.

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 3.—Michael Donovan, a Canadian, aged 42 years, a gunner on the lake-ocean freighter North-eastern, was severely injured when the boiler of the vessel exploded.
