"The conditions made for taking the vote are, in our judgment, arbitrary, artificial, unusual and unfair. We sincerely hope that two of them will be changed. The Christian Guardian must go into opposition, and vigorous opposition, to the basis laid down, unless changes are made.

(a) That the provincial voters' list should be used rather than the municipal lists, is defensible, but not important.

(b) That the vote should be taken in October, and on the 14th, is a bad provision for several reasons. The first plebiscite, taken under Sir Oliver Mowat's regime, was held on the same day as the municipal elections, and the present government, in carrying out the spirit of Sir Oliver's regime, and in meeting the convenience of the electors, should fix the vote for that day next January.

(c) That the decision should be dependent on one side polling to a very high standard is artificial, and that the prohibition voters should be the ones required to reach fully half the next provincial vote is, for a professedly temperance government, to demand a highly loaded referendum.

(d) The suggestion in the Premier's speech, which, however, is no part of the present bill, that if the law was carried in the referendum vote, then the authorization of "a commission on compensation" would be quite reasonable, is a weakening condition, put into the public mind, tho not in the bill.

This is a novelty, and like all novelties it catches the thoughtless. The effect of it is to absolve the liquor party from any obligation to bring out any vote in the referendum.
