Situation in Ontario to Be Discussed
at Zion Congregational Church.

The prohibition meeting at Zion Congregational Church to-night promises to be of unique interest. It will be preceded by an organ recital by Arthur Temple, the well-known musician. W. W. Dr. E. J. T. Fisher of the executive of the Ontario Alliance will preside.

A STRANGE CRIME.

Principal Witness Against a Con-
victed Wardman Is Found Dead.

New York, Feb. 18.—James McCallie, the principal witness in the trial of Wardman Glennon, whose testimony was thought to have been largely responsible for Glennon's conviction and sentence to Sing Sing, has met a violent death.

McCallie's death, according to the diagnosis of the hospital surgeons, was due to a compound fracture of the base of the skull, and a fracture of the nose. The man was unconscious when picked up in Sixth avenue, and did not regain consciousness.

McCallie lived at 146 West Thirty-third street. He made a complaint against Glennon for the first time when he failed to suppress an alleged disorderly house next door to his own home.

REFERENDUM A LOADED ONE

Rev. Dr. Courtice, in The Christian
Guardian, Discusses the Ross
Prohibition Bill.

MORE THAN 60 PER CENT. MAJORITY

Premier's Remark Concerning Com-
pensation Looked on as a
Weak Point.The Christian Guardian, discussing
Premier Ross's prohibition bill this
week, has this to say:

"The conditions made for taking the vote are, in our judgment, arbitrary, artificial, unusual and unfair. We sincerely hope that two of them will be changed. The Christian Guardian must go into opposition, and vigorous opposition, to the basis laid down, unless changes are made.

(a) That the provincial voters' list should be used rather than the municipal lists, is defensible, but not important.

(b) That the vote should be taken in October, and on the 14th, is a bad provision for several reasons. The first, the plebiscite, taken under the law as it stands, is held on the same day as the municipal elections, and the present spirit of Sir Oliver's regime, in meeting the convenience of the electors, should fix the vote for that next January.

(c) That the decision should be dependent on one side polling a very high standard is artificial, and that the prohibition voters should be the standard, and reach fully half the next provincial vote, is for a professedly temperate government, a demand as highly loaded referendum.

(d) The suggestion in the Premier's speech, which, however, is not part of the present bill, that if the law was carried in the referendum vote, then the authorities should be empowered to demand a highly loaded referendum.

"We are therefore required to poll a majority over their largest vote of about 10,000. Our majority was 80,000. Eighty thousand of a majority, with three hundred thousand voters, is a very high standard. Sir Oliver Mowat and the Hon. Mr. Ross as sufficient and overwhelming, as surprisingly large and decisive.

"To whose hands does the Star report when it requires 'more than a majority' to carry the referendum vote is gradually increasing. "The measure proposed is a pernicious one, because it strongly suggests the practice of trickery in voting. The incentive to the liquor trade is to enlarge the vote to the provincial elections, and then resist content while the high requirements and the disadvantageous time and the well-understood suggestion of a commission on compensation defers the bill in the referendum.

"The incentive to the prohibitionists is to stay at home, and keep down the total vote, and thus reduce the necessary half. The friends of the government find that a vote cast in their favor is an impediment to prohibition, and will on that account, to some extent, abstain from voting. To those who place prohibition before party, and are therefore in a measure not concerned as to which party is in power, and determined to lift this issue above all others, there is one course made specially effective, but that course is by the use of universal means. Any method of election that forces the consideration into the forefront for all these possibilities fruit, for all these possibilities fruit, for all these possibilities fruit.

"The measure proposed is an effort to escape the odium of a loaded referendum and of minority rule, but, if it is carried, it will be as heavily as three-fifths, and likely as heavily as two-thirds, of the total vote.
