any game of chance and skill in which (1) A bank is kept by one or more of the players exclusively

Sec. 198 : Every person is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to one year's imprisonment who keeps any disorderly house, that is to say, any common gaming house or common betting house as hereinbefore defined.

(2) Any one who appears, acts or behaves as master or as the person having the care, government or management of any disorder-iy house, shall be deemed to be the keeper thereof, and shall be liable to be presecuted and punished as such, altho in fact he or she is not the real owner or keeper thereof.

Sec. 199 : Everyone who plays or looks on while any other person is playing in a common gaming house is guilty of an offence and liable, on summary conviction before two justices of the peace to a penalty not exceeding \$100 and not less than \$20, and in default of payment to two months' imprisonment.
