# RUSSIA-LOSES ANOTHER TORPEDO

## Down to Join Makaroff and His Crew.

St. Petersburg, April 14.-The official bulletin this afternoon, conveying the nedo boat destroyer and the accidental crippling of another battleship, was almost as severe a blow as the loss of the Petropavlovsk yesterday.

The Russian word in the text of the official despatch describing the accident to the Pobleda means either 'mine" or "torpedo," but the qualifying verb indicates something moving to-

contusions on the knees. "It is certain that only two minutes elapsed between the explosion and the sinking of the battleship."

MORE DISASTERS.

Admiral Ouktomsky adds: "I have taken command provisionally of the fleet since the disaster to the Petropavlovsk. During some manoeu-vring of the battleship squadron, the Pobleda struck against a mine amidships on the starboard side. She was able to regain port by her-

self. None on board of her was killed or wounded.

He also says the Petropavlovsk sank "in consequence of the explosion of a mine while she was manoeuvring in the Port Arthur roadstead in sight of the enemy's fleet.'

Tokio, April 14—(5 p.m.)—A brief report from Rear-Admiral Uriu of Wednesday's fighting off Port Arthur reached the navy department this afternoon. It says Vice-Admiral Togo's fleet attacked Port Arthur in the morning and succeeded in sinking a battleship of the Petropavlovsk class and one torpedo boat destroyer.
