PRIVATE MEMBERS' DAY.

House in Committee on the G.T.P. Railway Bill.

Ottawa, May 2.—(Special.)—Monday being private members' day, the first business taken up in the house this afternoon was that of private bills, three of which were read a third time and passed, namely: The bill respecting the Quebec and Lake Huron Railway Company; Mr. Malouin.

The bill to incorporate the Boundary, Kamloops and Cariboo Central Railway Company; Mr. Gillmer.

The bill to incorporate the Provincial Intercolonial Railway Bridge Company; Chas. Marcl.

Col. Hughes was informed that United States vessels and goods enter ports in the Hawaiian Islands, Philippines, Cuba and Porto Rico on more favorable terms than do British and Canadian vessels and goods, for the reason that all excepting Cuba are ports of the United States.

In reply to Col. Hughes the minister of militia stated that the war office had declined to grant the King's medals to members of the Canadian Mounted Rifles who served twice in South Africa, on the grounds that the corps had not been nine months in service there.

Mr. Roche was informed that from June 20, 1903, to the first of April, 1904, the sum of \$742 had been paid by the government to the Winnipeg Free Press.

Col. Kaulbach was informed that the lightship Lurcher, built at Toronto, and now stationed in the Bay of Fundy, was constructed after the design of the United States lightship board.

On the Railway Bill. The house having gone into committee on the national transcontinental railway bill, Mr. Lennox moved the discussion of clause 4, by which the government's guarantee on the cost of the mountain section is increased to three-fourths of the total cost, from three-fourths of \$30,000 per mile.

Mr. Lennox showed that the 500 miles of mountain section at \$33,750 per mile would cost \$16,875,000. The government's share of guarantee would be 75 per cent. of this, or \$12,656,250.

Mr. Patterson submitted that the government had not been able to get the bill passed in 1903, and that the extension of time alone had been given to the country of about \$200,000, so that the interest liability was increased under the new bargain by \$1,753,225, and the bond liability by \$1,833,274.

CANADA-ALASKA BOUNDARY DELIMITATION THIS JUNE

Several Parties of Canadian and American Surveyors Will Begin Work Next Month.

Ottawa, May 2.—(Staff Special.)—The work of delimiting the Canada-Alaska boundary according to the finding of the London tribunal, will be begun early in June, and will be prosecuted by several parties of Canadian and American surveyors, operating conjointly, until the end of September.

From St. Elias east and south around the coast strip to the head of Portland Canal a distance of 550 miles, the boundary will have to be marked by the surveyors, as determined by the tribunal.

It is expected that about one-tenth of this distance will be delimited by the joint survey this season. This does not mean that it will take ten years to complete the marking of the boundary, but that the work will require ten years.

GRAND PARADE MAY 15 BIG REVIEW ON THE 24TH

Not Slightest Sign of Horse Show Visible at the Armories Last Night.

It was difficult to believe last night that one had not strayed into another building on either side the armories, seeing aquad after squad of men marching about, halting, marking time, wheeling, in every stage of drill, the bare walls echoing with the words of command and the shrill whistles of the new corps, where at 11.30 on Saturday night there were a great bank of seats and a spacious enclosure packed down with clay and tankard, while the last lovely skirt whirled round a corner towards a waiting carriage.
