Corn—By using a higher average per acre than was used when the government report was issued yesterday, the newspapers this morning made it appear that we would have a sensational crop of corn this year. They may be right or wrong, but this will make no difference to July or September shorts. Local receipts to-day were only 222 cars, which was 91 less than estimated, and is a sharp failing off. Prices eased off with wheat, but on the break the buil leaders, who sold some yesterday, bought it back again, causing a good raily. September corn has every indication of seiling over 60 cents, and we continue to recommend buying it on every sharp decline.

Oats—The estimate of 900,000,000 bushels in the government report looked discouraging to holders, who sold moderately. Had receipts not been small and under the estimates, and acceptances on bids light, there might have been a greater break. Prices are low, but temporarily the market looks soft with other grains.

DALRYMPLE REPORT WITHHELD. Expert's Opinion of Chicago May Be

Disappointing. Chicago, July 12,-The long expected report from James Dalrymple of Glasgow, Scotland, as to municipal ownership of street railways in general, and those of Chicago in particular, has reached Mayor Dunne. The mayor, however, said he could not give it out unt!! he had read !t thoroly himself, and claimed he had not had a chance to do it during the day.

"From what I have been able to learn of Mr. Dalrymple's communication, from the cursory looking over I gave it, I would hardly call it a report," said the mayor.
"A letter might be the better word. I can say nothing about it just now, however, as I am not thoroly enough acquainted with it. I cannot discuss it."

The inference was that from what the mayor had learned from the letter he was not entirely satisfied with it. It was hardly expected he would be after the publication of Mr. Dairympie's ideas, made while the Glasgow expert was in this country. Speaking of the stack on the theory of municipal ownership as a remedy for trusts made by Tom Lawson of Boston in his Kansas speech, Mayor Dunne said:

"Lawson says the only remedy in curping "Lawson says the only remedy in curbing the trusts is to sell off all stocks and bonds and flood the market. I did not say he was an anarchist, but his speeches certainly have an anarchistic tendency."
