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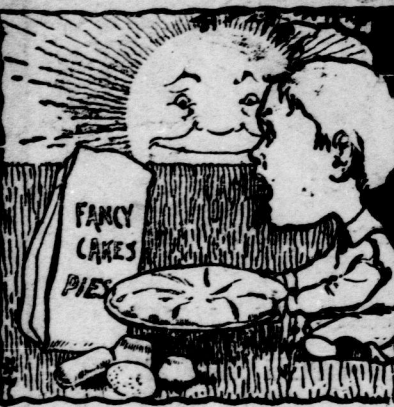

GAMBLE AWAY FORTUNE COUPLE TRY SUICIDE

Ronie, Aug. 9.—The identity of the couple who attempted suicide at Castellamare, the woman dying and the man surviving, has now been established. The man, John Buckingham, who is now in a hospital at Naples, is an Englishman, an engineer. His wife was Miss Jennie Ensign, a native of Massachusetts, and lately of New York, whence she brought a considerable fortune. This fortune was entirely lost in gambling at Monte Carlo. The couple drank a mixture of laudanum and arsenic leaving a letter saying they wished to die together.

ACTRESS RIVERS DROWNS

Upsets a Rowboat and Perishes With Her Escort.

Hamburg, Conn., Aug. 9.—Leaurence Gilkinson, of New York, and Miss Rena Rivers, an actress, of Boston, both summer boarders here, were drowned last night in Hamburg Cove while bathing on Eight-Mile River, a branch of the Connecticut. They were in a small row boat. Gilkinson's hat went overboard, and Miss Rivers in reaching for it, lost her balance and fell into the water. Gilkinson attempted her rescue, but both went down in 30 feet of water.

LEAVES WRECK TO FATE

Captain, With One Small Boat of Teutonia, Reports Loss.

London, Aug. 8.—Lloyds today announced that it had been ascertained from Muscat that the crew of the wrecked German steamer, Teutonia, from Bussorah, Asiatic Turkey, for Hamburg, which was wrecked July 20 on the southeast coast of Arabia, abandoned the vessel in four boats.

The captain and six men arrived at Muscat after touching at Masirah Island, where they were well treated by the natives. The captain reported that two of the boats became separated from the boat in which he reached Muscat. Their fate is unknown.

The fourth boat remained at Masirah Island, and the captain hoped she would start for Muscat when the prevailing monsoon had abated.

AUSTRALIA'S NEW TARIFF

Schedules Announced Show a Preference of 5 to 11 1/2 Per Cent.

London, Aug. 8.—A Sydney dispatch says the new budget expounded by Sir William Lyne is regarded by protectionists as a triumph for preference, while free traders call it a sham preference.

At present a close analysis of the tariff is impossible, but there is approximately an average of five per cent in favor of Britain. Premier Deakin was absent from the House through illness.

Mr. Cook, the Opposition leader, analyzed the preference lengthily. He said: "It is a tariff set up against Britain as well as against the foreigner. There is no trace in this highly-prohibitory tariff of that sacrifice which Mr. Chamberlain said is the basis of empire."

The tariff raises the duties on all the principal Australian manufactures. It embraces an elaborate scheme of duties on iron, which are subject to the passage of an iron bonus bill. Britain receives a preference of 25 per cent. There is no preference on the

larger agricultural machinery, but on hundreds of machine parts Britain receives special consideration.

The new duties are estimated to produce £200,000 annually. Ellis' extending protection to the consumer are promised later.

The Melbourne Age (protectionist) says many doubt the wisdom of a preference, seeing that the British Government unequivocally and even contemptuously rejected the principle at the Imperial Conference. "It is doubtful," it says, "whether it consists with our dignity or with prudence to offer a gift which the recipient treats with levity."

Another estimate of the British preference makes it average 11 1/2 per cent, an annual value of £1,200,000.

CANDY CURE FOR LIQUOR HABIT

Health Chief Feeds Children Sweets to Avoid Future Whiskey Drinking.

Philadelphia, Aug. 8.—According to Dr. A. C. Abbott, chief of the bureau of health, appetites for candy and for alcohol are kindred, and the taste for sweets precludes a craving for liquor.

In pursuit of his theory he makes a daily regular allowance of candies to his children to fortify them against the dangers of the other craving later on.

In a dissertation upon Dr. Abbott's belief Dr. J. Chalmers de Costa, the surgeon, advances the theory that twin appetites are a matter of temperament. The blonde will hanker for candy and the brunette for alcohol. This, he says, is because the brunette is more vital.

It is also asserted that with increasing freedom women are buying less candy and more liquor and that men are using more candy.

"It is only my personal theory," said Dr. Abbott, "not indorsed by any medical authority, that the appetite for candy and the appetite for alcohol are fundamentally the same, the choice of one or the other being determined by the temperamental qualities of the individual. Both sugar and alcohol are carbohydrates, with the same organic molecule, differing only in arrangement, and it is to me most probable that they both administer to the same organic craving."

"The appetite for sweets, developed, therefore, will take the place of the appetite for rum."

"The demand for candy is increasing and this is a hopeful sign. Statistics show it has increased more than 500 per cent in the last three years."

This demand for candy on the part of such a restless, nervous people as Americans is to my mind easily explainable. A person of nervous temperament necessarily expends a great amount of animal force, which is more readily supplied by such a readily oxidized carbohydrate as sugar or alcohol. For that reason I consider the child's appetite for sweets thoroughly normal. All young animals like sweet things."

GERMAN EXPERTS COMING

To Study Electrical Transmission Systems in America.

Berlin, Aug. 8.—The commission of electrical experts and railroad officials appointed to visit the United States for the purpose of studying American and interurban transportation facilities, will sail for New York from Hamburg on the Hamburg-Amerika Company's steamer Moltke. The commission will visit most of the United States, Canada and parts of Mexico. The trip will last three months. The commission will sail for home from Vera Cruz, Mexico.

During the course of their trip the experts will visit Salisbury, N. C., Niagara Falls, Montreal, Madison, Wis., Duluth, Minn., Colorado Springs, and Spokane Falls, Wash., and observe the high voltages which are carried long distances.

The second task of the commissioners is to examine the electrical transportation facilities of New York, Baltimore, Washington, Syracuse, Rochester and Chicago.

A PRINCE AMONG THE DEAD

Several Aristocrats Perish in Train Wreck in Germany.

Berlin, Aug. 8.—A passenger train was derailed last night between Posen and Thorn. The two engines were overturned and three cars were demolished. The official report says that eleven persons were killed and ten were injured. Among the dead are Prince Alexander Bogotoff, two sons of Count Tryeslering, of Mittau, Russia, and a Russian captain who was accompanying them.

According to official information late tonight, the casualties are confined to Russians, Poles and Germans. The number of dead and wounded has not been increased. Several survivors who have come into Berlin declare the overturned cars caught fire and that terrible scenes ensued. Many of the passengers escaped with difficulty.

MILITARY MISHAP

Troops Hurt by Exploding Mine Near Camberley.

London, Aug. 8.—A number of troops near Camberley on Monday received their baptism of fire, being bombed by a hurricane of stones and bits of earth, thrown out by an exploding mine. Ten men of the South Staffordshire Regiment were hurt, though not dangerously.

About a thousand troops at Frith Hill had been paraded to witness the Royal Engineers of the brigade demolish a portion of a field work by undermining and blowing up. Brigadier-General Campbell, the officer in command, had the work explained to the men, who were drawn up about 1,000 yards off, which was considered a safe distance.

To everyone's amazement, the force of the explosion, instead of being upwards or downwards, as was expected, was expended in a lateral direction, scattering stones and pieces of iron and earth among the troops. Many of the soldiers were hit by the flying missiles.

The men were at once ordered to lie down, and the troops instantly obeyed. Just as a second mine was sprung. This time the shower of stones passed harmlessly over their heads.
