

MINE MAGNATES WARNED IN TIME

Rand Govt. to Resist Attempt
to Close Works and Thus
Increase Idlers.

Pretoria, May 18.—Mr. Smuts today received a deputation of unemployed, 300 of whom marched from Johannesburg to Pretoria. The deputation submitted to the minister the resolutions passed at the meeting at Johannesburg, urging the Government to find employment for the whites in the mines.

Mr. Smuts, in reply, made a momentous declaration of policy. He said that he could not increase the wages on the relief works, and these must only be regarded as temporary. The solution must be sought in the absorption of the unemployed by the mines. "They had," he said, "the spectacle of the mines clamoring for labor and labor clamoring for work. The Chinese were introduced to meet the demand for unskilled labor, and this disastrous experiment had brought the deepest distress, one result of which was the unemployed problem. The Government would stick to its policy regarding the Chinese, and would repatriate them at the earliest possible opportunity. This would solve problems with which they were faced. The mines must be regarded not as the heritage of the rich alone, but also of the poor. It was the privilege of capitalists to put capital in the mines, but also of the working people to get employment in them."

Proceeding to refer to the demand for legislation to prevent the mines closing down, he said that he thought mine owners were not so blind to their own interests as to do this, but if they did the Government would not hesitate to act. The Government would systematically consider the question of working its own mines.

Mr. Smuts's remarkable statement puts the Government in sympathy with the democratic element in the Transvaal. It will be regarded as a declaration of war against monopoly control and the doom of the Chinese. It shows that the Government recognizes the gravity of the coming conflict.

Los Angeles, May 18.—Back to nature has gone the love of Louisa Douglas, whose late husband was the founder of the R. G. Dun Commercial Agency. First she loved a coachman, then she married a millionaire, next she inherited a fortune, and now she has married the gardener of a wealthy neighbor at Santa Barbara.

While a domestic in the home of Benjamin Douglas, founder of the commercial agency, Louisa fell in love with the coachman. A daughter of Douglas spoiled the house fell in love with his servant and married her. This marriage stirred the society circles of Santa Barbara and New York. After this marriage, about nine years ago, Coachman Connel sued Mrs. Douglas for breach of promise, but no one knows what percentage of his original claim for damages he received. About a year ago Mrs. Christian Herter, of New York, erected a stately mansion at a cost of \$100,000 adjoining Mrs. Douglas' estate. William Pester, once a peddler of fruits, was installed as gardener. Pester, in beautifying the Herter estate, was constantly in sight of Mrs. Douglas. EX-EMPRESS GETS COSTLY RELICS

Eugenie Cancels French Government Debt of a Million Dollars.

Paris, May 19.—By the judgment of a Paris court, the ex-Empress Eugenie is authorized to take possession of certain objects now in various French palaces and museums, on the ground that they were the private property of Napoleon III.

One of the reasons given in their decision by the judges was that the articles in question were of no interest either from the point of view of art or of history.

They include a book given by the Pope to Napoleon I., a portrait of Louis XVI. by Lebrun, a sword of Napoleon I., the bit of the horse Napoleon rode at Waterloo, the bench on which Napoleon often sat at St. Helena, and a box which belonged to St. Louis.

The litigation dates back to twenty-eight years ago, when the ex-Empress commenced an action to recover from the imperial palaces which had become national property under the Republic certain articles which she claimed belonged to the Emperor personally, as distinct from Crown property, which reverted to the nation. Nearly all the inventories of the collection in the various places were destroyed at the time of Commune, but the Administration of Public Domains after years of patient research drew up a list of objects which were the personal property of Napoleon III., and which will now be restored to his widow.

It is considered more than likely, in view of the gifts already made by Empress Eugenie, that the majority of these relics will be presented to Malmaison or other museums.

It is reported that the decision of the Court in favor of the ex-Empress was the result of a compromise. By the judgment of the Seine Tribunal, rendered in 1879, the French Republic was declared to be a debtor to the Empress, as the heiress to the third Napoleon's private fortune, to the amount of nearly 3,000,000 francs. The debt was not contested, but Parliament never voted an appropriation to pay it. It is understood that Empress Eugenie intimated her willingness to let the matter drop entirely if the articles which were the object of the present suit were restored to her. In a sense, therefore, she pays about 5,000,000 francs, reckoning the principal and compound interest, for a number of souvenirs which the Court declares of neither historic nor artistic interest.

WOULDN'T DRINK IS SHOT DEAD

Washington Society Man Is
Accused With Killing His
Cab Driver.

Washington, May 18.—Frank Macaboy, a local hack-driver, was shot early today at the Arlington Hotel by Gaston P. Philip, of this city, and Cleverock, N. Y. He was removed to an emergency hospital, where he died tonight.

Philip, who is well known in social circles here, was placed under arrest immediately after the shooting. While there are no eye-witnesses to the affair, there are two versions. Macaboy made a statement at the hospital, in which he is reported to have said that because of his refusal to take a drink with Philip, the latter shot him; that there was no quarrel whatever between himself and Philip.

The other version gives as the cause of the trouble of Philip to pay a \$150 cash fare bill he is alleged to have owed Macaboy. At first Philip maintained that Macaboy tried to collect the bill from him, and that he was endeavoring to explain to Macaboy that he would pay the bill in time.

Later Philip said that at the time in question there was no dispute in regard to the bill for \$150.

Philip had been stopping at the hotel for about two weeks, and during that time, it is said, had been with Macaboy on several occasions. Last evening Philip hired an automobile for all night, and he and Macaboy were in each other's company until they reached the hotel shortly before the shooting. When the hotel was reached Philip went to his room.

Macaboy did not go up with Philip, but followed him a few minutes later. Indications are that Philip went to his room, and from a valise he procured a revolver and started out into the hall with it. Macaboy and Philip met in the hallway, and there the shot was fired.

MOTHER EDDY'S STATEMENT

Says Suit Over Property Was Taken
Contrary to Her Wishes.

Concord, N. H., May 18.—A letter from Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy to Judge Robert N. Chamberlain, who is to preside at the term of the court at which the suit of Eddy vs. Frye is entered, was filed in the superior court this afternoon. It says in part: "An increasing demand upon my time, labor and thought, and a yearning for more peace and to have my property and affairs carefully taken care of for the persons and purposes I have designated by my last will, influenced me to select a board of trustees to take charge of my property, namely Hon. Henry M. Baker, Archibald McLean and Mr. Josiah E. Ferri."

"I had contemplated doing this before the present proceedings were brought, or I knew about them, and I had consulted Lawyer Streeter about the method."

"No person influenced me to make this selection. I find myself able to select the trustees I need without the help of others."

"This suit was brought without my knowledge and is being carried on contrary to my wishes. I feel that it is not for my benefit in any way and for my injury, and I know it was not needed to protect my person or property."

"The present proceedings test my trust in divine love. My personal reputation is assailed, and some of my students and trusted personal friends are cruelly, unjustly and wrongfully accused."
