ONE-THIRD FEWER DIE Old London's Public Health Act Prover of Much Value.

London, Dec. 29.—The report of the medical officer of health of the county of London, dealing with the health of a population of 4,721,217 for the year 1906, shows a decrease in the death rate of 30 per cent since the passing London's rate in 1906 was 15.1 per thousand, lower than that of any town in England of over 200,000 population, excepting Bristol and Leicester.
