

War Session of American Cabinet Is Discussing Immediate Mobilization of Nation's Financial, Army and Navy Resources.

SENATE FOREIGN RELATIONS COMMITTEE APPROVES MESSAGE OF THE PRESIDENT

House Leaders Predict Unanimous Passage For War Resolution Within Few Days—Pacifists Are Falling Into Line.

Washington, April 3 .- The United States really is at war with the German Empire today, awaiting only the formal recognition of Congress.

Every agency was moving to gird the nation against the Government which President Wilson in his address to Congress characterized as a natural foe to liberty.

The cabinet, at a war session, was called to dis cuss the extension of credits to the nations already at war against Germany; the raising of money by taxation for use of the United States in the war; the equipment of the navy to the fullest state of efficiency to cope with the submarine menace, and the raising of a great army on the principle of universal liability to service—the first increment of which is to be 500,000

WAR BONDS RISE IN LONDON AFTER WILSON SPEECH

Anglo-French Issue Jumps From 92 1-2 to 95.

FINANCIERS ARE ELATED

Except For Group Who Were Pulling For Further Drop in Price.

The practical declaration of war by the United States has resulted in a disthe United States has resulted in a distinct rise in certain values, particularly Anglo-French bonds, in which a number of Londoners were interested.

Washington, D. C., April 3.—Conditions in Spain have become normal again. A dispatch from the Spanish foreign office to Ambassador Riano here today said:

"Normal conditions have been re-established at Valladolid, and two shops have been reopened for the railway workmen there. Absolute tranquility prevails throughout Spain."

EMPRESS OF GERMANY IS

Mobilizing Resources, The council of national defence and its civilian advisory commission, in a joint session, continued the work of mobilization of the national resources. Reports have been current for some time that additiona Cabinet members might be appointed to direct such work in co-opera-tion with the council. It has been said that a secretary of munitions

and a secretary of transportation might be created. Foreign Committee Approves. Work in Congress on the resolu-tion to formally declare a state of war existing went rapidly forward.
The Senate foreign relations committee approved the resolution as introduced without change in its effect. The House committee is expected. The House committee is expected to act later today.

Action by the Senate within at least two or three days was predicted today even by senators opposing it. Some of the "wilful men" named by President Wilson declared emphatically there would be no filtered. be no filibuster or protracted debate, although several want to speak at length. Amendments from Republican senators, especially to vent a formal alliance with the En-

tente or a federal loan to them, are May Sit Until June. Leaders of both parties in the Senate are disposed to pass only appropriation and other war measures and adjourn. Some leaders believe it possible to adjourn by May 15, but some Republicans think June more probable.

House leaders predicted unanimous support to the president. The only possible objection foreseen by them was to a possible proposal to send troops abroad at once. Later, after an army had been well trained, if the war continued, they thought the House would support such a plan. Pacifists In Line.
