It was the first air raid carried out by the British fliers which did not aim at purely military objectives.

Turner is under arrest on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of Marion Stone, who died today at the of Marion Stone, who died today at the General Hospital following an alleged operation. The doctor is confined to St. Michael's Hospital, suffering from blood-poisoning, and his condition is said to be serious.

Dr. Turner is under police surveillance, and will be removed to the jail as soon as his condition permits.

The doctor's arrest has caused a sensation in medical circles. Norman Joliffe, chauffeur, is also under arrest.






