A football league will be organized and referred to the executive. Detailed arrangements for other sports were also left to the executive, which was given power to add to its membership to look after each particular activity.

CZECHO-SLOVAKIA'S TEAM IS TO MEET WINNIPEG FALCONS

Will Clash in Olympic Battle at Antwerp Tomorrow.

Antwerp, April 23.—Canada's hockey representatives, the Falcons of Winnipeg, will meet the Czechoslovakia team in the opening round of the Olympic games hockey tournament here tomorrow night. The game will be the third of the series, the first between the two teams being scheduled for tonight and tomorrow afternoon. Tomorrow night's game will be watched with particular interest for the Canadians and Czechs were named as favorites in the betting by the Belgian hockey enthusiasts when the teams displayed their speed in the first practice, and a very keen contest is anticipated. The Canadians are still favorites with the majority of those who have been following the preliminary work of the teams, but the United States team appears to have replaced the Czechs as second choice with most of the experts.

Six teams were paired in the opening round in last night's draw with France drawing the United States, and the Czechs the United States. The United States will play the championship and first place game on Monday night. Unless there is an unexpected upset, the Falcons are now expected to face the United States team in the final match.

The result of the final draw is as follows:

France, a bye in the first round.

Sweden vs. Belgium, tonight.

United States vs. Switzerland, tomorrow afternoon.

Canada vs. Czechoslovakia, tomorrow night.

Under this draw, France will play the winner of the Swedish-Belgian match on Sunday afternoon, and the winner of the Canada vs. Czechoslovakia match will meet on Sunday night.

The surviving teams will play for first and second place honors on Monday, while the five teams eliminated in the rounds before the final will continue until Thursday in a second elimination round for third place.

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FRENCH DEPUTY WOULD FORCE PEOPLE TO TAKE UP COUNTRY'S LOAN

Paris, April 23.—In the chamber of deputies yesterday, M. Lugol proposed a law instituting a forced loan to liquidate the war debts, whereby every Frenchman possessing a capital of more than 50,000 francs should be required to subscribe in the following proportion:

From 50,000 to 100,000 francs, 5 per cent; 100,000 to 200,000 francs, 10 per cent; 200,000 to 500,000 francs, 15 per cent; 500,000 to 1,000,000 francs, 20 per cent; 1,000,000 to 2,000,000 francs, 25 per cent; 2,000,000 to 5,000,000 francs, 30 per cent; 5,000,000 to 10,000,000 francs, 35 per cent; 10,000,000 to 20,000,000 francs, 40 per cent; 20,000,000 to 50,000,000 francs, 45 per cent; 50,000,000 to 100,000,000 francs, 50 per cent.
