WASHINGTON, May 10.—That the spirit of discontent in the island of Porto Rico toward the United States is not imaginary, but real, was stated on the floor of the house by Mr. Larrinaga, the commissioner from that possession. He called attention to the act passed by the 54th congress, by which he said "the rights and the liberties of our people were exiled"; that act, he declared, "is the leaden block that closed the sepulchre where the liberties and rights of American freemen are buried."

6000 POLICE ON PARADE

NEW YORK, May 10.—Led by an honor company of men who have received official recognition for valor, bravery or meritorious service, six thousand policemen clad in summer uniforms and white hats marched thru New York streets Saturday in their annual parade.

YOUNG CONSERVATIVES HEAR FOWLER AND ROCHE

Government is Arraigned—Chinese Laundry Raid—A Shooting Charge.

HAMILTON, May 10.—(Special).—George W. Fowler, M.P., and Dr. Roche, M.P., addressed the Conservative Club Saturday evening. The gathering asked Mr. Fowler to say something about Hon. Mr. Emmerson, but he declined, dismissing the subject with the remark that it was not polite to speak ill of the dead. Dr. Roche declared that Sir Wilfrid Laurier was but a figure-head. He deplored the corrupt practices of the government but said Ontario was better than the rest of the Dominion in this respect. Hon. Mr. Aylesworth, he said, was one of the greatest failures a minister. His bill was really an act to elect all Liberals in Manitoba. The Galicians were frightened into voting for the government by the fear of conscription. Samuel Barker, M.P., and Col. Ploenny, the Conservative candidate in Wentworth, spoke briefly. Mayor Stewart presided, and a vote of thanks was tendered to the speakers on motion of R. McCullough and F. C. Bruce, ex-M.P.

FIRETRAP HOTELS.

Movement Under Way for National Investigation in U. S.

CHICAGO, May 10.—An investigation of hotels all over the United States with a view to discovering fire-traps and preventing catastrophes like the New Avenue Hotel fire in Fort Wayne, Ind., has been started by the Illinois Commercial Men's Association.

By order of the board of directors of the organization, the Canadian branch was instructed to send out circular letters to all the 40,000 members of the association asking for a report on the condition of hotels in every part of the country.

The action was taken as a direct result of the Fort Wayne hotel fire, in which three members of the association were burned to death. Reports will be made to the organization and a legislative program will then be worked out.

DRUMMERS START RUMOR TWO INNOCENTS ARRESTED

Women Traveling on Night Train Are Victims of Police Blunder.

SYRACUSE, May 10.—Mrs. L. A. Herron of Franklin, Pa., detained by the Syracuse police on suspicion of being the detective had for yanking her out of a sleeping-car berth at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon and continued her journey to New York on the Empire State express. Her mother accompanied her.

It is but justice to the higher officers of the department to say that they realize the stupid error of detection as soon as they clapped eyes on the woman the detectives brought back with them early Saturday morning from Utica. The police description of the wanted woman stated that all her upper teeth were heavily plated with gold. The woman with the detectives had excellent regular teeth and only one is gold capped. She was able to prove her identity in a score of ways.

The police circular states that Mrs. Guinness is considerably above the average height and weight. So is Mrs. Herron. That was the only ground the detectives had for yanking her out of a sleeping-car berth at 2 o'clock in the morning and accusing her of being the murderer of a dozen men in front of the Hotel Powers Hotel.

The most astonishing feature of the affair is the absolute lack of ground for the arrest. Two traveling salesmen from Detroit and retained her in the coach. That piqued and annoyed the drummers and between them they evolved the idea that she was endeavoring to hide the Powers from them. Then they thought they had seen the face before and one sapiently suggested it was much like the alleged pictures of Mrs. Guinness printed in various newspapers.

The drummers got off the train at Rochester and told their yarn to the hotel detective at the Hotel Powers. He told a police friend, who told a police lieutenant, who got as busy as a bee immediately. He telephoned the Syracuse police and they, thinking the Rochester police must have some ground for such a tip; sent two men to meet the train.

WANT TO KNOW WHY.

Canadian Parliament Scooped British Commons on Some Despatches.

MONTREAL, May 10.—A London cable says: "The ministers are to be invited to explain in parliament this week how it comes about that important despatches to Canadian ministers from Sir Edward Grey respecting Canadian treaty-making powers, have been given by the imperial authority to the British parliament and withheld from the Canadian parliament. Especially the reference is to Sir Edward Grey's letter, dated from the foreign office, July 4, 1909, which, L. P. Brodeur read to the Canadian parliament on March 3, last, which is evidently one of a series of which the British parliament has been informed. This despatch of July 4 is interpreted as formally renouncing the imperial authority in treaty-making affecting Canadian interests and read as giving the Canadian ministers authority to enter into negotiations with foreign powers unknown to and independently of His Majesty's government. It is thought it may even be construed as removing the necessity of a Canadian reference of a treaty to the foreign office, even as a formality."

There is to be a big debate in the house of lords next Tuesday on the Franco-Canadian treaty when it is expected the British government will be asked, not in a hostile spirit to explain the exact nature of these changes in inter-imperial relations.
