

GORMAN AND SNODGRASS A WAY TONIGHT FOR MEET AT NEWBURGH

TO COMPETE IN MID-ATLANTIC CHAMPIONSHIPS

Both Boys Going Good—Need of Action by Local Authorities

CHARLES I. GORMAN, world champion amateur skater, will leave this evening for Newburgh, N. Y., where, on New Year's Day, he will compete in the Middle Atlantic championships. He will be accompanied by Edward Snodgrass, who also is entered in the championships.

Gorman is the present holder of the Middle Atlantic championship and is favored to win again this year, as he is said to be in excellent condition and going as fast as ever, but will have plenty of competition as he will have to defeat Val. Blais, international champion; O'Neill Farrell, U. S. National champion; and a large field of other United States skaters, including Paul Forsman, winner of the event in 1924; Lew Morris, of New York; Paul O'Brien and others. It was expected that a field of about 100 would start.

Snodgrass is liable to spring a surprise at the meet as it is said that he is skating the fastest of his career and is so confident of making a good showing that he is going to Newburgh at his own expense. He will enter all the races which consist of the 200-yard, 440-yard, 880-yard and one mile. He also will enter the three-mile Joseph F. Donohue memorial race, as will Charlie. A high point score for Snodgrass will immediately place him in the first rank of speed skaters, as winning honors in such a class field would be a big feather in his cap.

NO INTEREST HERE.

It is to be regretted that Willie Logan will be unable to go to the meet, but no provision had been made for securing expenses for this skater. It is going very fast this year. He did no rowing last summer and has increased in weight and is said to be in fine condition. No provision had been made by local skating authorities for the sending of any of the local boys and it is too bad that things have been permitted to drag along as they have. Gorman is having expenses paid by the promoters of the meet and Snodgrass is paying his own way. Saint John has been placed on the sports map of the world in recent years because of the achievements of Charlie Gorman and others and it is not to be allowed to die out as there are several most promising junior and intermediate skaters coming along who, with the proper encouragement, should help keep Saint John to the forefront in this line of sport.

Rickard Predicts 5 New Ring Champions

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—Taking his annual glance into the future, the book, "The Rickard Year," predicted that five new boxing champions will be crowned in 1927.

ASKS BOSTON FANS TO RESTRAIN SELVES

Each Spectator Handed Card With Request For Better Behavior

BOSTON, Mass., Dec. 28.—"If you must throw anything during your excitement, try a ball somewhere!"

Such is the admonition addressed to loyal, but over-exuberant hockey fans by Chas. F. Adams, president of the Boston Bruins, as a result of a player-officials' meeting at the Arena here last night, during a game between the St. Pauls of Toronto and the Bruins.

During an argument between players and officials, the latter filed into the goal, the gallery got into the mixup by hurling paper, candy, eggs and pennies onto the ice. Adams, president of the Bruins, took home with them 63 pennies, one hard-boiled egg, a monkey wrench, and a letter in which he was told to "keep the Bruins out of the game."

Adams, who is the head of the Bruins, said that the "hockey" fans had been "very bad" and that "hockey" players in the heat of the game may be excused for occasional loss of self-control, but that he is not so readily forgiven.

"I am referring to clattering up the ice with various missiles, which only embarrasses the Boston management by delaying the contest, and does not harm the referee or opposing team. Referees are but human and will make errors of judgment at times, but their mistakes are trivial compared with that of a hockey fan who so forgets himself that he adopts uncivilized methods."

The Bruins' president closed his plea with the earnest suggestion and the hope of friendly co-operation.

Trophy Offered For Basketball Playoff

A trophy emblematic of the New Brunswick basketball championship will be presented to the senior winners this year. A. G. Plummer, local engraver, has voluntarily offered a cup and will have it suitably engraved at the close of the present season when the provincial winner has been declared.

Mr. Plummer's generous offer will undoubtedly add interest to the playoff games, all of which will take place during the month of March between the winners of all leagues in this province.

There will be plenty of silverware at stake for the New Brunswick winners this year as the handsome trophy now in possession of the Winnipeg Tolars will go to the winner of the Eastern Canada playoffs and another large cup, donated by Lord Byng, ex-governor-general of Canada, will go to the final winner between Eastern and Western Canada.

CARLETON CLUB MEETS



LEONARD DENIES HE WAS REMUNERATED

Says He Acted For Good of Baseball and Never Received Money

FRESNO, Cal., Dec. 28.—Hubert B. (Dutch) Leonard denied here tonight that he had sold to American League officials the letters of Ty Cobb and Joe Wood which were made public by Baseball Commissioner Landis in connection with the latest baseball scandal. Leonard declared he turned the letters over to baseball authorities in the belief that he was lending assistance in clearing up certain conditions which were detrimental to the good of baseball.

The former Detroit player said he presented his evidence in regard to an alleged deal to "throw" a game between Detroit and Cleveland late in the season of 1919, some time after he had received a settlement of claims against the Detroit Club for loss of salary during the seasons of 1922, 1923 and part of 1924.

"I never received any money directly or indirectly for any letters or for any information in my possession," he asserted.
