

# N. B. DEFICIT \$756,590 FOR YEAR SLATED

Auditors Place That as Figure in Statement Issued

## DETAILS OF YEAR'S BUSINESS GIVEN

Lands and Mines Receipts Largest—Liquor Commission's Income \$329,114

FREDERICTON, Jan. 29.—The Province of New Brunswick, according to the statement of receipts and expenditures furnished to Hon. A. J. Leger, Provincial Secretary-Treasurer, by the Comptroller-General, W. A. Loudon, covering the fiscal year closing Oct. 31, 1925, has a deficit of \$756,590.81 on current revenue account. Included in this amount is \$467,119.45, the actual deficit on current revenue, and \$289,470.06 as interest on bonds and other charges connected with the Saint John and Quebec Railway. The share of the earnings of that railway which are given to the province amounted to \$56,809.64.

A year ago the Government, then led by Hon. P. J. Veniot, had a statement which showed a surplus of \$10,129, exclusive of the Saint John and Quebec Railway account. The audit this year was made by P. S. Ross & Sons, chartered accountants, of Montreal. The previous administration employed Price, Waterhouse & Co., of Montreal.

### LIABILITIES AND REVENUE

The total liabilities of the province are placed at \$37,599,814.94, according to the balance sheet. Current liabilities are placed at \$3,193,728.74. The consolidated balance sheet places the liabilities at \$36,094,802.19.

For the fiscal year the total revenue is shown as \$4,154,730.45. The largest item of revenue is that from lands and mines, a total of \$1,210,396.49. Miscellaneous collections totalled \$707,080.82.

From the New Brunswick Liquor Commission receipts totalled \$329,114.00, and those from motor vehicle fees \$300,592.83. The Liquor Commission and the Department of Lands and Mines produced less revenue than in the year before, the receipts for that year being respectively \$400,195.34 and \$1,871,273.62. Motor vehicles fees and miscellaneous collections through the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer's Department totalled, for 1924, \$450,671.18 and \$601,498.15, increasing last year.

### HEAVIEST EXPENDITURES

The heaviest expenditures during the year were made in the Department of Public Works, where \$1,010,239.90 was spent, an increase of about \$97,000. The Department of Education drew \$448,116.19 from the public purse with \$38,109.92 in addition for vocational education. Legislation cost \$72,818.18 and the Department of Agriculture, \$123,561.02. On the Department of Lands and Mines the expenditure was \$204,829.42, and on Public Health, \$102,192.37. With some few exceptions the expenditures in the departments were larger than the year before.

## MACHINERY EXISTS FOR OUSTING KLAN

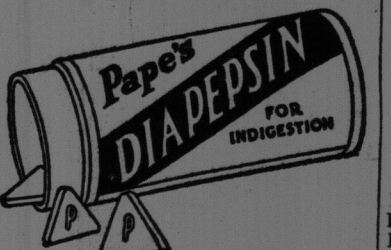
Labor M. P. Call Attention of Minister of Justice to Body's Aims

OTTAWA, Jan. 29.—The Ku Klux Klan was discussed in House of Commons today. J. S. Woods, member of Winnipeg, N. B., referred to the Klan's activities in British Columbia and ironically suggested that while he would not urge upon the ministry of justice the wisdom of deporting the Klan's membership, he would remind the minister that the machinery for deportation existed.

Mr. Woodsworth declined to read in full the circular said to have been sent out by the Vancouver Klan. It is, he said, of the Klan as being White, Protestant, Christian and law-abiding. Because it was white, it objected to Orientals, because it was Protestant it presumably objected to Catholics, but as it was Christian it was apparently hostile to Jews and its claim of being law-abiding meant no doubt that it objected to people who did not agree with its teachings and was prepared to take drastic measures against such people.

## C. N. R. Orders 1,500 More Tons of Coal

This will make a total additional order of 135,000 tons. In connection with this latest order for 15,000 tons it is reported that the stipulation in this amount shall be taken from the Princess Mine, in Cape Breton.
