Some 752 acres was taken from the inglewood Company by this construction. The original water area was 40 acres, he said. In addition, there were 42 acres taken from other people's property, making a total of \$34. Wintess said there were 469 acres of the Inglewood property included in net flooding. Asked who owned this extra 42 acres, he said it was mostly crown land with a small part belonging to private owners. He said the water could not have been raised appreciably above the level without flooding this 42 acres. The height of the dam here was about 50 feet. It was found necessary, he said, to erect 25 dams for the entire Musquash development.

Weston, chief engineer of the N. B. Electric Hydro Commission, at this morning's session of the Ingle-wood hearing before Mr. Jústice Le-Blanc here.

Mr. Weston said he had investigated the only possible site for such a dam and at 12 feet win had found nothing but sand and boulders. A rock and carth dam would be a hazardous construction, he declared, through danger of seepage underneath and if this dam, if built, did give way, it would carry away the Log Falls and Scott's Falls dams below it. Mr. Weston was on the stand at adjournment until this afternoon. P. J. Hughes, K. C., conducted the examination.

Respecting Sherwood Lake and the recommendation of Frederick Brown, the company's chief engineering expert, that a dam could be built there, the witness said he had made an investigation of this and found it a difficult dam site. He said tests of the foundation had been made at the only possible dam site and at 12 feet down only sand and boulders had been discovered. Bed-rock had not been reached at that depth. It was a very inaccessible site in regard to getting materials to this point. It would be impossible, he thought, to build an absolutely dependable dam there and as a result of his investigation, he said he had decided not to recommend construction of a dam theme.

Asked regarding a rock and earth fill there, he said it would hardly be safe because of seepage underneath.

He esthmated such daming would cost about \$60,000,000 cubic feet could be impounded. It would, however, be an extremely hazardous dam as if it would give way it would sweep out the Log Palls and Scott's Falls dam below.


