Hundred-year-old Franklin
Again Warm Patrons
of Queen.

Fredericton, Oct. 4.—Old patrons of the Queen Hotel welcomed an old friend this week. The Franklin that had been in the office for very many years, with a break since J. J. McCafferty retired from ownership, was returned to its place, and a crackling blaze warmed the guests that evening.

This Franklin is more than a century old. It was cast in Glasgow. The late John Edwards, so long associated with the Queen, used to assert that the late King Edward, when Prince of Wales, warmed his royal toes before it.

When the Clerk of the Privy Council came from Ottawa to Fredericton to swear in the late Lieutenant-Governor "Twiddle" he wanted to buy the Franklin but Mr. McCafferty declined to sell.

"Well," said the Ottawa man, "if ever you are willing to take \$100 for it, let me know."

To sit before the blazing fire and try to picture the men and women it has warmed these hundred years brings up historic memories that are quite different from the conditions and the fashion and customs of today.

CHILDREN GO ON PICNIC

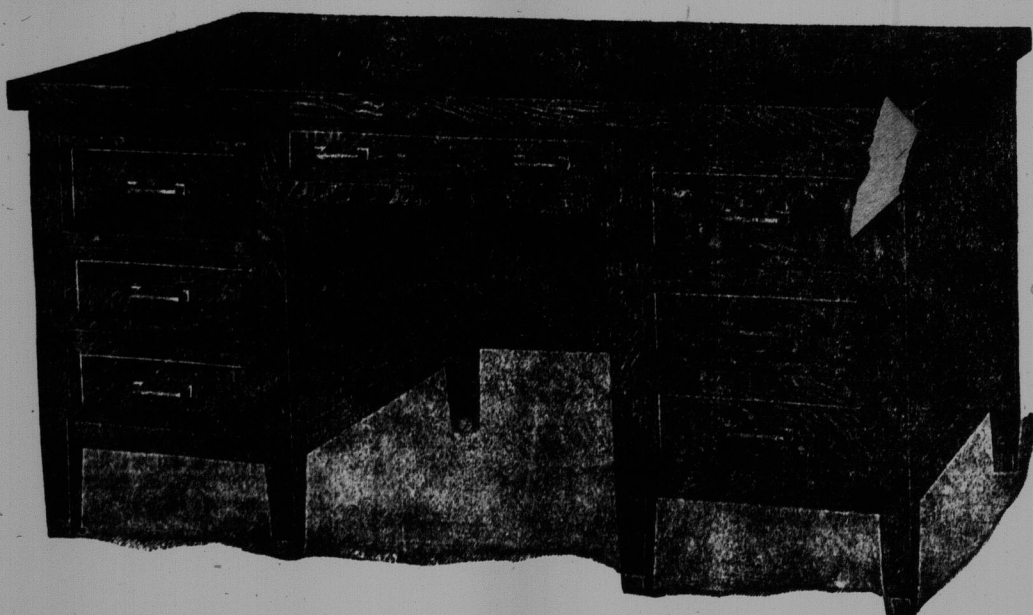

PRINCE RUNS HIS SPECIAL TRAIN

Royal Engineer Wins Praise of Trainers on Western Run.
Hope, B. C., Oct. 4.—En route from Jasper National Park to Vancouver, the Prince of Wales yesterday afternoon took over the job of running his own special train through the Fraser River Canyon. The Prince mounted the engine-cab at Boston Bar, B. C., and introduced himself to the regular train crew and Master Mechanic Austin who was riding the engine. His Royal Highness, with a copy of the train orders before him, and his eye on the second hand of his watch, started the train out of the divisional point. It was a good start without any jar. About one mile from Boston Bar, the train was observed on the track and the Prince slowed down the train and blew the warning whistle. The train moved off into the bush and with the release of the brakes the big locomotive swung again into her stride.
