HOLLAND AFTER TOURIST TRAVEL

Restrictions Lifted to Draw
More Americans to Coun-
try—Belgium Also Offers
Inducements.

The Hague April 5.—(Associated Press by Mail)—To encourage tourist travel in Holland this summer the Dutch government has removed many of the passport restrictions which American tourists met here a year ago.

Visas are now granted which are valid for six months, without necessity of securing new ones for entering and leaving the country during that period, and re-entrance with the police is no longer necessary for travelers from America, unless they remain longer than one month.

Belgium has made similar arrangements, eliminating so far as possible the necessity for frequent trips to consuls etc., but because the United States charges a fee of \$10 for visiting the passport of a foreigner, Belgium retaliates by making an equal charge for Americans, although travelers of other nationalities pay a much smaller fee.

PASSOVER

Passover, the feast of unleavened bread, is to be celebrated this year beginning this evening, and continuing a week, the concluding service of the holiday falling on Friday, April 29.

The festival of Passover, called in Hebrew "Pesach," reached back to remote antiquity when it was observed by the early Hebrew tribes as an agricultural spring festival. At an early period Pesach was transformed into a festival celebrating the redemption of the Hebrews from Egyptian slavery.

By connecting this festival with the wondrous deliverance of the Hebrews from the Egyptian yoke, the festival was provided for its observance. The festival and the ritual ceremony observed during the seven days in which it is celebrated among Reform, or eight days among the Orthodox, is not only identified with the exodus of the children of Israel from Egyptian slavery but further symbolizes joy in the triumph of liberty and freedom over oppression and slavery.

The festival of Pesach was used by the synagog as a means of commemorating the Jewish home to God, who is regarded as the Redeemer and Protector of Israel. The story of the deliverance of their forefathers from bondage and slavery reminded the Jews of God's providential guidance and gave them confidence in their final redemption from all oppression and war.

During the Passover week the "Matzo," unleavened bread, is eaten. This food, described as the "bread of affliction," is a symbol reminding the present generation of the hasty exodus of Israel from the land of oppression.

The feast of Passover is ushered in with a home ceremony, the "Seder," held on the eve of Passover. All members of the family participate in its observance. The ritual of the Seder includes the reading of a richly adorned tale of deliverance, "The Hagadah," wherein the various events leading up to the exodus and immediately following are told.

The "Seder" celebration radiates an exuberant spirit of thankfulness and joy. The symbolism of the Seder reflects the circumstances of the enslavement of the Children of Israel in Egypt as well as the hopeful outlook for the final triumph of freedom for all mankind.

ONTARIO ESTIMATES.

Toronto, April 22.—At 1.20 this morning, the provincial treasurer, Hon. Peter Smith, tabled the main estimates, amounting to \$22,081,450, as well as the main estimates of the hydro-electric commission, which total \$6,948,199, and the estimates for the University of Toronto, amounting to \$7,138,199.

The main estimates include \$600,000 as a grant for the school of anatomy building at the University of Toronto, which will ensure the university receiving the Rockefeller grant of \$1,000,000.

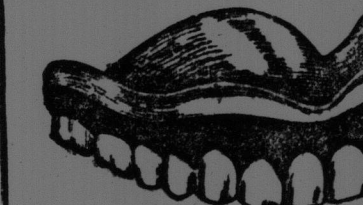
