PREPARING FOR RENFORTH DAY

Halifax Oarsmen Will be Well Represented at Maritime Rowing Championships.

(Halifax Echo.)

The oarsmen of the North West Arm and St. Mary's Clubs are busily engaged on arrangements for their trip to the Maritime Championships at Renforth, N.B., on Tuesday of next week.

“Renforth Day.” St. Mary's excursion leaves on Saturday morning, having a D. A. R. special, and will go via Digby to St. John. The party will number one hundred or more. The club entries for the championship events will be the senior and junior fours, John Power in the intermediate and senior singles and Geo. Power and L. O. Connell in the junior singles.

John Power's single shell was so badly damaged on route from Buffalo that it is unfit for use, and Jim Gowen of the North West Arm Club, who is also a member of St. Mary's Society, has offered to Power, a college senior of his, the use of his Shinn's single, which is almost identical in construction with Power's own boat.

The North West Arm Club party of about twenty-five will leave on Sunday night by the C. N. R. train, going direct to Renforth, and that avoiding the bad shifts at Digby and St. John. COMMANDMENTS FOR MOTORISTS

A St. John motorist brought The Times a clipping setting forth the “ten commandments” for driving, and said he would suggest two more—one that both lights should be kept burning at night to avoid confusion in the mind of a motorist coming the other way; and the other that in turning a street corner the driver should not cut across, but go right up and turn the corner as nearly as possible at right angles, thus avoiding possible collisions at a crowded traffic street crossing. The other ten commandments are as follows:—

1. Drive on the proper side of the road; it's just as good as the other.

2. Slow down when approaching a cross-road; it is nearly as dangerous as a railroad crossing.

3. Look out for children. You can never tell what they'll do, and you're always wrong if you hit one.

4. Try to help instead of hinder the traffic officer; he's there for your good, and he's got a tough job.

5. Be sure that your “dimmers” really dim; it's no joke driving into a blinding glare, as you probably know.

6. Read and obey the warning signs; they're not put up as ornaments.

7. If you feel you've got to speed do it where you won't kill anybody but yourself.

8. When making minor repairs, stop where your car may be seen from both directions; otherwise you may stop longer than you anticipate.

9. Speeding around corners is a straight route to the hospital. Don't race past a stopped street car. Some day the jury may call it manslaughter.

10. Use discretion. The fact that you had the right of way won't bring anybody back to life least of all yourself.

LET ALL OR NONE CARRY FIREARMS

Alternatives Considered by French Authorities—Week End Wave of Killings.

Paris, Aug. 18.—A fatal duel between two men with knives, a fight between two girls armed with scissors over an unfaithful lover, the murder of a soldier by two companions for 300 francs, the suicide of a man who tried to kill his wife, and of another who killed his mistress, and the murder of her lover by a girl at a crowded race meet, are some of the week-end crimes in France as told in Monday morning's papers.

The wave of killing and violence which has continued all summer is calling forth loud denunciation on the part of the press, which condemns the leniency of magistrates and of the government in including many criminals in the general post-war amnesty. The number of people carrying arms for defence and for offence is stated by gunsmiths to be enormously greater than ever before, and it appears that if arms are bought ostensibly for defence, they are being used freely for attack. The police and the government are puzzled whether to strictly enforce the law against carrying arms or to allow everyone to carry them.
