**ANOTHER EXAMPLE OF GERMAN BAD FAITH.**  
Paris Church Hit by Shell on Feast of Corpus Christi—Long Range Guns Busy Again Today

Paris, May 31.—The German long range bombardment of Paris was resumed early this morning.

A shell struck a Paris church yesterday. An official making the announcement adds: "This fact should be compared with Cardinal Von Hartmann's request to the British government that Cologne not be bombarded on the Feast of Corpus Christi. This is another example of German bad faith, for the least that could be expected was that Germany would have the same forbearance toward Paris as was asked for Cologne."

Paris, May 31.—Some airplanes crossed the line in the direction of Paris last night. The "all clear" signal was given at midnight. The enemy machines were under a heavy fire from the defenses of Paris. Some bombs were dropped on the region about the city but there were no casualties.

### LORD BEAVERBROOK SURPRISES PEERS

Tells of the Multifarious Services of His Department in Answer to Charge

London, May 31.—Lord Beaverbrook made his first speech as minister of information in the House of Lords this week, and although it is a quiet assembly, offering a very different sort of strain from that of the House of Commons, there was just a touch of nervousness in his opening notes. Perhaps as a financier and a business man he would have felt more at ease in the Commons, although while he was there he seldom spoke, taking little notice of the talk for talking sake. Very soon this shyness wore off and presently one caught the Canadian accent, though not the accent of his subject.

The account he gave of the multifarious services being rendered by the Information Department surprised not only the Peers but the public when they read the report the next day. There has been no reason why the office should proclaim its activities. Indeed, the better plan is not to make a parade of them. In the present instance Lord Beaverbrook was meeting an insinuation that enough had not been done, and therefore that he would make a report.

**CADET AVIATOR KILLED TAKING HIS FINAL TEST**  
Mineola Army Base Says Youth Killed Machine at Wrong Angle, Causing it to Fall

Mineola, L. I., May 31.—Cadet Aviator Charles S. Passwater of Nobleville, Ind., was killed when his airplane dropped 300 feet while he was flying near the grounds of the Meadowbrook Hunt Club. The machine went into "tail spin" and before Passwater could straighten it out the plane hit the ground.

It was said at Hazelehurst aviation field that the cause of the accident was not known, but it was thought that possibly Passwater was flying at too flat an angle, and the machine was stalled. He was unconscious when lifted from the wreckage and died an hour later in the post hospital.

Passwater, who was twenty-three years old, came to Hazelehurst about three weeks ago from a southern training camp. He was completing his training and expected to get his commission as a lieutenant in about two weeks. He was preparing to land at a designated spot, a part of his training course, when the accident occurred.
