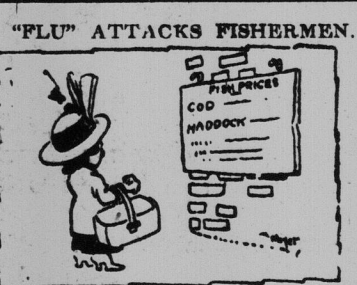

"FLU" ATTACKS FISHERMEN.

Housekeepers cannot expect to get cod and haddock from now on as cheaply as they did during the summer months. There are many factors to be taken into consideration in the fluctuation of fish prices. During spells of bad weather fish landings fall off to an appreciable extent and the fish that are secured are worth every cent paid for them as oftentimes the fishermen risk their lives to bring them in.

The recent epidemic of Spanish influenza exacted its price among the fishermen, too. Boats were held up while their crews lay sick. The result has been a decrease of something like 500,000 pounds of fish in the monthly catch.

Food Board Flashes

It has been estimated by the Millinery Chamber of Commerce that the expenditure of women's headgear in the United States is more than \$250,000,000 a year. This would average \$5 per capita for women and girls of all ages.

This huge amount spent on hats would pay for nearly thirty times the quantities of beef, bacon, butter, eggs, condensed milk and other foodstuffs from Canada to the Allies last year. Thrift could be made to pay for the war.
