**Says Nelson Too Old.**  
Cincinnati, Nov. 2.—Battling Nelson, erstwhile lightweight champion, will not be permitted to box Tommy Gary of Chicago in a ten-round bout here on November 11, if William A. Fiesler, chairman of the boxing commission, has his way. Mr. Fiesler is of the opinion that the latter is getting too old to take severe punishment. Wabash, Ind., Nov. 3.—Jack Dillon of Indianapolis knocked out Jack Flynn of Stoveston, Ill. in the fourth round of a scheduled ten round bout last night. Flynn was floored twice in the final round.

**Has Knocked Out 54.**  
New York, Nov. 3.—Charles Lebour, champion bantam weight of France and claimant of the world's title, who has just arrived in this country today, expressed his willingness to meet any of the 110 pounders.

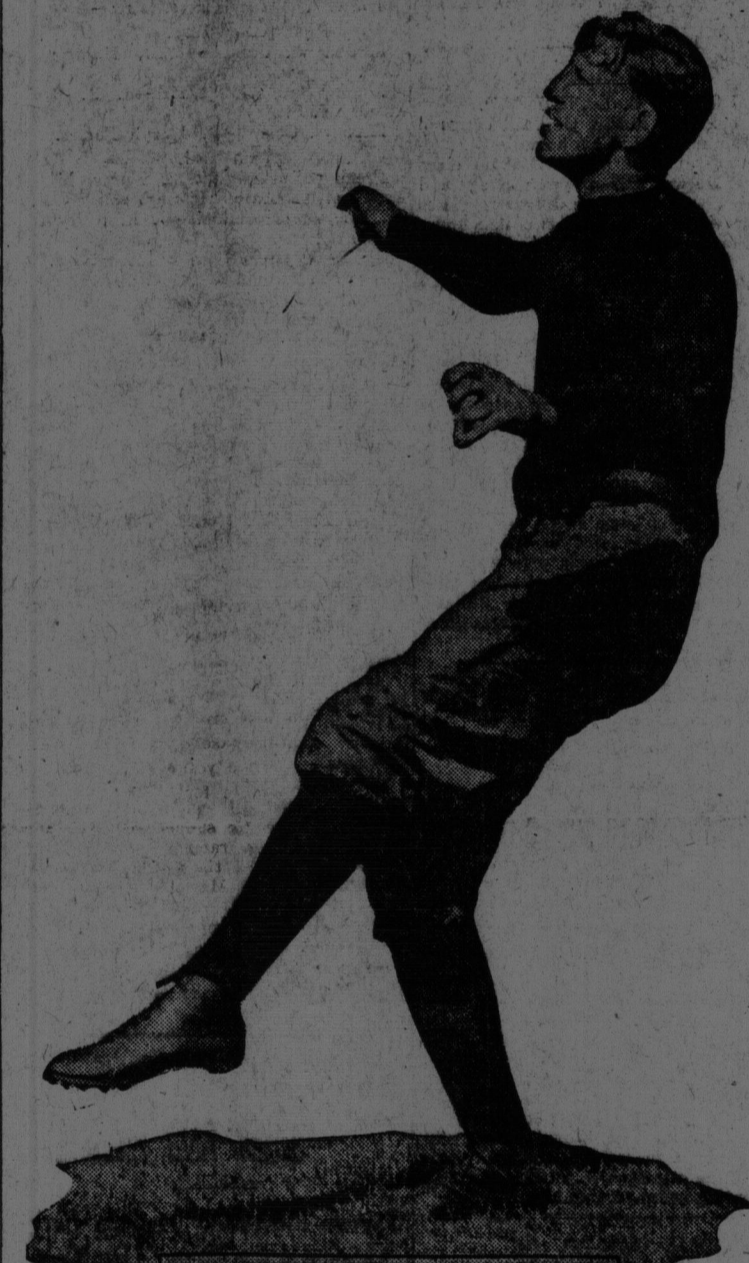
