LAST CAMP WEEK FOR SOLDIERS

Work of Entraining at Sussex Will Be Begun On Friday
PREPARE SHAM FIGHT
Likely Will Be on Friday—Infantry on Outpost Duty Tonight—Manoeuvres Yesterday Reconnaissance of Surrounding Country—The Bright Side of Camp Life
(Special to Times.)
Sussex, N. B., July 3.—The camp season this year will be brought to a close on Saturday night. The work of entraining the troops will be begun on Friday afternoon after the annual field day, the much anticipated "sham battle" has been conducted. Some of the regiments will leave the grounds Friday evening while others will depart on Saturday. Rear parties will be left to see that the lines are clean of debris, refuse, etc., and that all rubbish and waste have been carefully burned. For this is a matter which has to be strictly complied with according to one of the regulations.
The Canadian Ordnance Corps will remain on the grounds probably about two or three weeks to store the large number of tents, guns, ammunition, etc., and the Army Service Corps will likely leave a large rear party to attend to the unfinished work in connection with their duties, and to return home on Monday.
The big event of camp with many of the men, namely the sham fight will take place on Friday night, tonight, a feature entirely new in the drill at Sussex, though day outposts are always an establishment. The plan of arrangements for the sham fight is now being considered through the leaders of the attacking and defending parties have not been named.
In preparation for the work of Friday night the manoeuvres of yesterday consisted of a reconnaissance of the surrounding country, and two parties were arrayed against each other. The battle of manliness could be heard within the camp and the redcoats scouting in the underbrush by the stream, along the railroad track, or in other sections of the grounds knew that a sharp fight was on in the vicinity and that their friends among the cavalry were protecting the camp from an enemy encroaching upon it, by way of St. Mary's, and also protecting a convoy arriving by way of Petrolia. A fierce but bloodless encounter occurred and for a time the air was wafted with smoke. No one was wounded, however, and the members of both parties will be on hand again today. The cavalry and dragons rode from the scheme of reconnaissance several miles from camp, and carrying a day's rations with them.
Camp Sussex was enveloped yesterday from early morning to late in the afternoon in an atmosphere of quietness, unusual during the season of drill. It was due largely to the fact that both the infantry and the cavalry were engaged in a tactical scheme which called for their being outside the parade ground most of the day. The cavalry and dragons rode from the encampment early in the morning and engaged in an elaborate reconnaissance scheme in the neighboring country. One squadron rode to Waterford and others rode in other directions but all knew of the other movements by a chain of signalling stations, and those inside the camp grounds were kept in touch with what was going on nine or ten miles away by telephonic stations established on hill-tops about that distance from the encampment. These flashed the news to stations inside the limits and the movements of the troops were made known in camp.
There are a few cases of small consequence in No. 2 field hospital, but the average number of patients for camp has been very small. Private Wm. O'Brien, of the 28th B. N. Dragons, was brought to the hospital today suffering from blood poisoning. He had picked with a jack-knife a sore on one of his hands and the poisoning was the result. One or two men of the infantry have been in the hospital with minor ailments, but there are no gross cases. Two of the patients are confined with measles, but these are not expected to spread further. Private Fred Wright, of the 71st regiment, is in the hospital with a dislocated knee. Private Bruce McVicar, of the 28th Dragons, who was kicked in the face by a horse, was discharged today. Private H.
