Plan to Have a Street Commissioner

The experiment of having a street commissioner such as is employed in many of the larger Upper Canadian and American cities may be tried in St. John. The plan originates from a motion moved by Alderman Hayes at the last meeting of the common council to the effect that Assistant City Engineer Hatfield be given direct supervision of streets. The motion at the time was declared out of order but it is understood that it will be brought up again at the meeting of the board of works tomorrow evening when it is possible that a recommendation will be made to the council in favor of the scheme.

Those behind the movement feel that better results would be attained from an engineer in direct control, and in support of the assertion point to the fact that the practice is in vogue in many of the large cities. 
