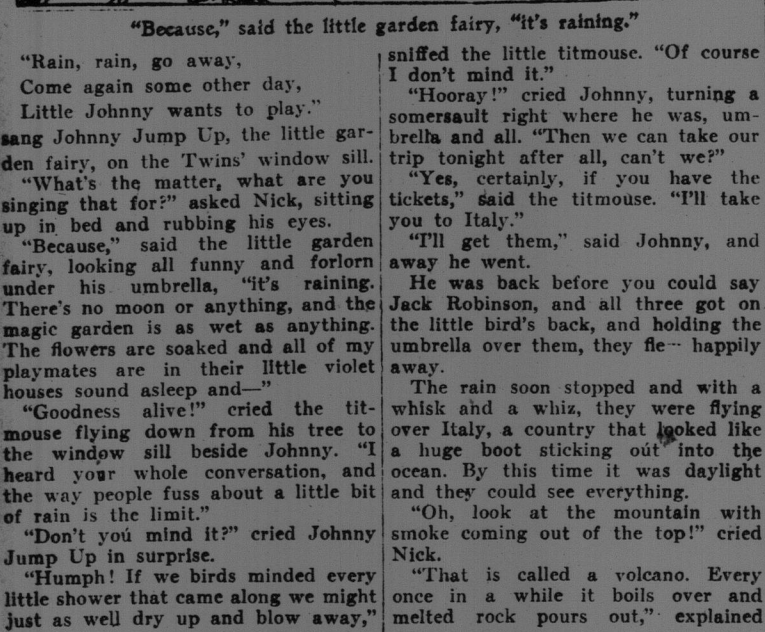

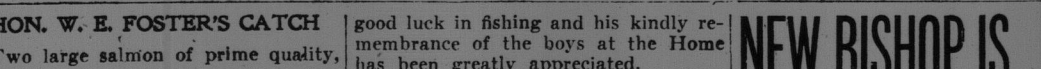

Rome, June 23.—Pope Pius today appointed Rt. Rev. Francis C. Kelly

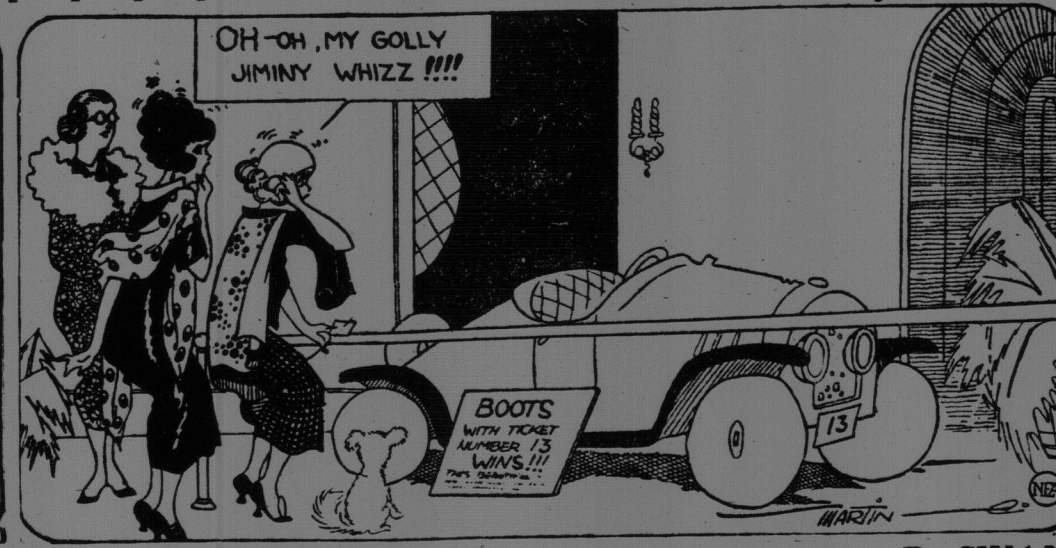

Chicago, June 23.—Monsignor Kelley founded the Catholic Extension Society October 18, 1905, became its acting president and was elected president of the society in 1912. The society was established canonically by Pope Pius X June 19, 1910, by whom Bishop Kelley was appointed its first president for three years and since reappointed. In 1913 he founded and became editor-in-chief of the Extension Magazine.

Francis Clement Kelley was born at Vernon, R. I., June 18, 1864, October 23, 1883, and was ordained a priest in 1888. He was pastor at Lapeer, Mich., from 1892 to 1907, Holy Brothers Parish, Detroit, 1907-1910, and was elected XV. in 1915.

keep them in health.

Health is a fairly democratic entity
that is not rich and poor, old and
young, tall and short, strong and
serf alike; and illness does like-
wise.

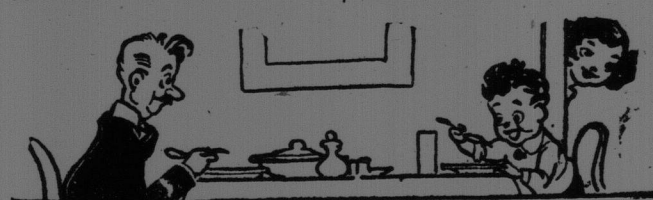
There are certain variations of
healthful food elements and these
are generally as obtainable by the man in
the cottage as by the man in the castle.
The only way to know what are the
necessities, let each reader write in his
notebook that the normal man, woman

and child, requires, products from grain,
fresh fruit, fats and eggs, some meats
and some sweets (except where doctors
order otherwise) and lots of fresh
fruits.

Such calculations as have been made
indicate that sweets are the least neces-
sary on this list and that meats in ex-
cess are the most harmful.

But in the root and leafy vegetables
lie certain necessary vitamins and in
the fruits and eggs.

Unless diet has been ordained a
simple variation from day to day in
the selection of foods insures a nutritious
series of meals.
