HEBREWS URGED TO BUY WAR BONDS

Trade's Body Announces Its En-
dorsement of War Aims of Allies
New York, April 12.—Conviction that
militarism and Junkerdom must be
crushed has replaced doubts held by the
United Hebrew Trades as to the moti-
ves which caused the European war,
according to a proclamation sent by the
organization to its 400,000 members en-
gaged in the needle trades on the East
Side, urging them to buy Liberty bonds.
"At first we did not have much con-
fidence in the motives that caused the
European war," the appeal says. "We
well knew that the Czar's government
was interwoven with the Junker bu-
reaucracy and we could not bring our-
selves to believe that these leaders of
massacres, these anti-Semites, would
really fight for the rights of oppressed
peoples."
Then, the appeal says, after Germany
declared the whole Atlantic ocean a war
zone and America entered the war, an-
other great event occurred.
"Russia, revolutionary Russia, allowed
herself to be fooled and laid down her
arms. She hoped that the German popu-
lation, oppressed by the yoke of the
Junkers, would rise in rebellion. But a
revolution in Germany is impossible."
Asserting that the German government
had proved its real character after
Russia had made a separate peace, the
appeal continues: "Russia's only hope of
freedom depends upon the defeat of Ger-
many, the crushing defeat of the Junkers,
the destruction of the mailed fist that
ruined the world."
"MAKE ONE!"

officer, "that the enemy has no weak

**CIVILIANS OF ARRAS
BEING MOVED AWAY**
Paris, April 12.—The civilian popu-
lation of Arras is being removed.
Arras, which is situated about three
miles west of the German line on the
Scarpe River, has been under enemy
bombardment for more than three years.
This bombardment has been particularly
heavy since the present German drive
started.
Similar evacuations have been made at
other French towns close to the lines,
including Amiens.

**GERMANY IS USING
HOLLAND AS A TOOL**
Press Says Wilson Has Belied His
Traditions About Right by Ship
Seizure
The Hague, April 12.—As President
Wilson's speech at Baltimore has not yet
been published in full in Germany, the
newspapers refrain from extensive com-
ment.
The Lokal Anzeiger says that the
whole world knows that the present bat-
tle in the west is the result of the En-
tente's desire to fight, and that Wilson
Cuba have influenced the Entente, had
he really desired peace, but he did not
want to prevent the Versailles decisions.
It adds that he belied all his traditions
about right and humanity by his course
toward Holland. It goes on:
"He now calls openly for the utmost
force, and so finally clearly defines Amer-
ica's and the Allies' policy. Germany
will not allow the joke of force to be
applied to her. For this reason she

The German press is not losing an op-
portunity of using the requisitioning of
Dutch ships as propaganda against the
Entente. This and the fact that Holland
is obliged to feed many foreigners are
favorite topics.
The Weser Zeitung asserts that the
Dutch government has informed the
German government that it must send
supplies of foodstuffs for the French,
Belgian, American and Russian subjects
in Holland, but that no answer has been
received yet.
The newspaper states that Germany
is ready to comply with such a demand
and that steps have already been taken
by Berlin.
Up to the present nothing is known
of these reported demands by officials
of Allied circles with the exception of
the feeding of prisoners of war.
THE ONLY DIFFERENCE.
New York Sun.—An official of a pil-
laged city who was brought before At-
tilla, asked him why he had burned the
place to the ground and killed the in-
habitants. "They resisted me," he re-
plied. A semi-official despatch from
Berlin in referring to the destruction of
the Parish church and the accompanying
loss of life says: "The responsibility
for the security of the inhabitants of
Paris must rest with the French gov-
ernment."

CAR TRACKS AS PLAYGROUNDS.
One of the mottoes in the safety cam-
paigns recently carried on in various
cities throughout the country is "Be-
hind the wheel make a danger."
In mind that car tracks make a danger-
ous playground. The warning is whole-
some for all streets used by any consi-
derable traffic.
If children are to be warned off the
streets, however, some other playground
must be provided. A study made some
months ago in four typical neighborhoods
in Kansas City showed an average of
nearly 85 per cent of the area taken up
with streets and alleys and less than 5
per cent in private yards and vacant lots
usable for play. The fact that there is
nearly seven times as much street space
as private play space in these typical
neighborhoods helped to account for the
fact that 71 per cent of the children out-
doors after school were found on the
street or alleys.
This condition has been partly met in
some cities by spring playgrounds in
school yards which are being tried as an
experiment. But if the full value of the
play is to be obtained the work should
be extended to all schools and put on a
permanent basis.
CUT OFF PHONES AT BORDER.
American Companies Act Against Ger-
man Agents in Mexico.
El Paso, Texas, April 13.—Telephone
communication between American and
Mexican border towns is to be suspen-
ded for the period of the war. This ac-
tion is voluntary by the telephone com-
panies and designed to prevent informa-
tion regarding military movements reach-
ing German agents in Mexico.
Communication has been severed be-
tween Brownsville and Matamoros, be-
tween Laredo and Nuevo Laredo, and
Eagle Pass and Piedras Negras. The
same action is to be taken between here
and Juarez, and at Douglas, Naco,
Nogales, and San Diego, west of here.
An elaborate system of "underground"
communication between German agents
in America and Mexican towns opposite
here has been discovered, and the action
of the American telephone companies is
expected to curtail such operations.
