



USE MORE MILK: CAMPAIGN PLANNED

National Dairy Council Has Planned \$75,000 Fund For Propaganda

Ottawa, Oct. 18-Plans for a campaign fund of \$75,00 to conduct propagands encouraging the increased use of milk and its products as food were launched at the close of the meeting of the National Dairy Council here. The council represents the affiliation of the organizations of producers and distributors of milk and dairy products throughout the country. The fund will be raised by an assessment on producers and distributors. The council passed resolutions to be forwarded to the government protesting against the high duty on dairy machinery and bottles, and the high cost of feed for dairy herds, stating in the latter connection that there could be no reduction in the cost of dairy products until feed came down. The annual meeting of the council will likely take place in Winnipeg next February. encouraging the increased use of milk
