REPORT.

In bringing this Report before their friends, the Committee of the Kingston Ladies' Bible Association, in connection with the British and Foreign Bible Society, would give to God the glory, who has enabled them to per-severe in this work of faith and labor of love for sixteen years.

I. CIRCULATION OF SCRIPTURES.

Distributed by the Ladies and Bible Woman during the year, and by the Colporteur during two months-127 Bibles, 201 Testaments, and 11 Gospels.

II.

THE TREASURY.

The Treasurer's Report shows that the sum of \$206.671 has been collected during the year, \$13.771 of which has been for the sale of Bibles.

The expenditure has been \$171.58-leaving a balance of \$35.091 in Treasurer's hands.

III.

The balance in the Treasury being larger than usual, your Committee resolved to send a small sum to the Parent Society. \$25, or £5 Sterling, was sent to the Kingston Society with a request that they would transmit it to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

IV

In the month of October a Colporteur was engaged. The short time he has been employed will account for the balance at the close of the year being larger than usual.

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
The balance in the Treasury being larger than usual, your Committee resolved to send a small sum to the Parent Society. \$25, or £5 Sterling, was sent to the Kingston Society with a request that they would transmit it to the sold 52 copies of the Scriptures and 6 of single gospels. She has frequently met with the exclamation —"How can Bibles be printed so cheaply," and her explanation of their cheap-ness awakens considerable interest in the Bible Society.— The most important and useful part of the work is that of personal conversation and influence with those of her own sex, whom she thus visits at their homes, reading and praying with them wherever she finds it expedient. Many of the parents in these houses never attend a place of public worship, and their children go to neither Sabbath or Day School. Among such, her efforts have been very persever-ing; her kindly exhortations and interest and sympathy with which she enters into their troubles, seems often to be the means of awakening, at least, a desire for reformation. In some cases where she has met with poor women, once respectable, but whose course has been an ineffectual struggle with difficulties, and a gradual descent into poverty and wretchedness, she has met with a softening and impressibility of spirit which is very encouraging; and in some instances she has had the satisfaction of seeing visible results follow her labors. Intemperance among mothers of fam-lies, which is only too common, she has earnestly sought to reform—seeking to lead these poor women to Him, who alone can give strength to resist temptation. On the whole, Mrs. Jack's visits have been well re-

ceived; though sometimes it is not till they have been once or twice repeated that they awaken much response; and while encountering no instances of rudeness or refusal, even in the most degraded places, she has generally been cor-dially invited to return, and has met with much encourage-ment to persevere in her useful work.

A short extract from one of the Collectors reports may be added here.

One says, "I met in my district a family without a Bible, and fearing they would not buy one for themselves, I offered one from the Loan Stock-the next time I went there the woman had the money wrapped up ready to hand me, saying—'her husband said it was such a beautiful Bible he would not think of parting with it.'"

In closing this account of their stewardship your Committee would observe, that humble as this agency is, they believe it to be a work of the spirit, and therefore cannot doubt that God has honored, and will continue to honor, it with His blessing. In His strength they desire to labor; depending on His promises, they assure themselves of eventual success, and pray that they may carry on this work ever anticipating the sound of "Well done good and faithful servants."

In the month of October a Colporteur was engaged. The short time he has been employed will account for the balance at the close of the year being larger than usual. The small subscriptions, rarely exceeding \$1, can barely admit of more than sending a Colporteur out for six months, and employing a Bible Woman for the year, besides having a Loan Stock to supply the aged with Bibles of large print, and occasionally giving to those who could not buy them ; \$30 has been laid aside for this purpose.

An extract from the Colporteur's Report is here added. " As a Colporteur for the Kingston Ladies' Bible Association I began my labors on the 9th October, 1865, in the County of Lennox, travelling through the Townships of Richmond, Fredericksburgh, Tyendinaga and Camden. In two months I sold 242 volumes of the Scriptures. I found the people of all creeds very kind, and if they would not buy from me, they would treat me in a friendly manner. I met with some very poor people—one woman with five children, poorly clad, wanted a Bible for 1s. 3d. She told me to ask the owner of the next house to pay me for it, as her husband worked there, but he refused, and it affected her so much, that I gave her one at my own expense, not knowing then that the Ladies would wish me to give Bibles. Every day a Colporteur has opportunities to speak a word for the Lord. At one house I met five or six men One man said they had plenty of Bibles, but and women. they did not read them. When I spoke to them of the awful consequences of such neglect of God's Word, some of them thanked me, and said they knew it was for the good of their souls. I found a man on his death-bed, and spoke to him of the change that was necessary if he would go to heaven. He asked me to pray with him, and I did so. There are difficulties which ladies and gentlemen are not aware of; and if it was not because the work is the Lord's, the heads of Colporteurs would often hang down. Still it is a cause of thankfulness to see the desire people have generally for the spread of the Gospel. They wish the Colporteur God speed, and encourage him by their kindness. "May the Word of the Lord spread until every house

A short account of the Bible Woman's work is here given from the Lady Superintendant's Report. The former Bible Woman, Miss Henley, being inca-

pacitated by ill-health from performing the duties of the office, Mrs. Jack was engaged for this important mission in April last. She has proved herself a faithful, zealous and peculiarly well-qualified worker, devoting three afternoons of each week to visiting, (except when laid aside by illness) during a period of nearly three months. She generally visits ten or twelve families in an afternoon, and takes with her some of the Society's Bibles, which she offers for sale, going in this way to every house, but repeating her visits only where she sees they are needed.
