An extract from the Colporteur's Report is here added. iation I began my labors on the 9th October, 1865, in the County of Lennox, travelling through the Townships of Richmont, Fredericksburgh, Tyendinaga and Camden. In wo months I sold 242 volumes of the Scriptures. I found
he people of all creeds very kind, and if they would not my fiom me, they would treat me in a friendly manner. met with, ome very poor people-one woman with five
liildren, poorly clad, wanted a Bible for 1s. 3d. She told ne to ask the owner of the next house to pay me for it, as her husband worked there, but he refused, and it affected her so much, that I gave her one at my own expense, not knowing then that the Ladied would wish me to give a word for the Lord. At one house I met five or six men and women. One man said they had plenty of Bibles, but hey did not read then.. When spoke to them of the them thanked me, and said they knew it was for the good of their sonls. I found a man on his death-bed, and spoke thim of the change that was necessary if he would go to
heaven. He asked me to pray with him, and I did so. Theren. are difficulties ased to pray with him, and I 1 dies and gentlemen are not aware of ; and if it was not because the work is the Lord's, he heads of Colporteurs would often hang down. Still it sencrally for the spread of the Gospel. They wishl the Col. porteur God speed, and encourage him by their kindness.
