

in the matter, the Synod appoints the following as a committee, empowering them to make arrangements with the authorities of the Home as to the most convenient time and place for such pastoral oversight to be carried out.

By consent of House, the amendment replaced the original resolution, and was—*Carried*.

The Bishop appointed the following gentlemen as the Committee:—Ven. Archdeacon Evans (convener), Rev. E. McManus, Mr. R. White and Dr. Davidson, Q.C.

Moved by Rev. Canon DAVIDSON, seconded by Archdeacon LINDSAY, that the Synod desires to place upon record its sense of the paramount importance of the Christian Education of the daughters of the Church, and hence heartily approves of the efforts towards this great object in the Church school for girls in connection with the institution known as the Dunham Ladies College, and earnestly commends its support to every member of the Church in the Diocese—*Carried*.

The Synod rose at 1 p. m.

The Synod re-assembled at 2.30 p.m.

Dr. DAVIDSON moved, seconded by Mr. C. GARTH, that the Synod learns with regret from the charge of the Lord Bishop of the diocese, that a number of cures or missions still remain without pastoral care, and would express the hope that such vacancies may be filled as soon as possible with duly ordained men, in accordance with the principles and teachings of the Church, and would strongly urge upon the members of the Church the necessity of making due provision by increased contributions to the Mission and other funds of the Diocese—*Carried*.

Moved by Archdeacon LINDSAY, seconded by Rev. Canon MUSSEN, that the Synod desires to place on record the recognition of its loss in the death of the Rev. T. A. Young, a faithful and devoted minister of the Church, a member of the Synod since its inception, and the incumbent of the mission of Coteau du Lac during a period of thirty years—*Carried*.

Moved by Rural Dean RENAUD, seconded by Rev. Canon MILLS, that the Synod desires to express the deep sense of the loss it has sustained in the death of the Rev. Robert Acton, whose services as Emigration Chaplain were most faithfully rendered in a spirit of Christian kindness and attention to his duties which endeared him to all, and made him most acceptable to those strangers who, immediately on landing, found him a wise and reliable friend—*Carried*.
