The revolting crime is partially obscured by the extraordinary circumstances surrounding the case and leading in a clearly defined way to inevitable violence. Stripped of its legal verbiage, the jury's conclusions charge the prisoner with having murdered the 15-year-old son of his employer, Sept. 9, by firing a load from a shot gwn into his victim's head.

The evidence heard yesterday was brief and largely a repetition of the testimony offered Menday. Mrs. Schlieuhauf, sister of the victim. Colin McPherson, a neighbor of the Preeman family; Farmer Holtzel and Undertaker Cullen were on the stand. Their evidence related to the confession of King that he had fired the shot, the position in which the little body was found in the stable loft and the absence of powder stains on the corpse. The witnesses established beyond question all the material circumstance that the prisoner had said he shot the boy because he was jealous of the family favors he received, and with the hope that if he was removed the affections and property of the Freem'ns would be transferred to him.
