



POWERS TO FIND A FRIENDLY SOLUTION

Servia is Less Belligerent-**Russia's Claim to Passage** of Dardanelles.

London, Oct. 12 .- The news received this morning from the storm centres in the Near East confirms the belief held in London that the powers will find a friendly solution of the crisis which has agitated Europe for more than a week. Servia, it is now thought, has fallen in line with the other states directly interested, and is taking a more quiet view of the situation. The resolution of the Servian national assembly, passed this morning, which amounts practically to a vote of confidence in the government, has taken the matter of Servia's attitude toward Austria-Hungary out of the hands of that easily swayed body, and placed it with the cabinet. The members of the cabinet are aware of the actual state of affairs, and doubtless will heed the warnings of the powers and take no rash steps. The owers can, therefore, continue negotiations in the matter of an international conference without fear of an interrup-tion by the outbreak of hostilities among any of the Balkan powers.

There is no reason to believe that the Russian minister of foreign affairs, in asking for a conference, does not desire to reopen the entire Near East-çrn question. That he is asking for something, however, is confirmed by a statement made to-day by an official of the Russian embassy. This diplomat said:

"Great Britain cannot adhere to the stand she has taken, namely that the conference must be confined to the actions of Bulgaria and Austria-Hungary."
