Saranac Lake, N. Y., Jan. 31.—Ideal weather conditions and perfect ice appear probable for tomorrow when a field of seventy skaters will be sent out in the first senior and junior events of the National Amateur Skating Championships scheduled to last for three days.

The events for the first day are 200 yards and one mile seniors, and 200 yards and a half mile juniors. Seven elimination heats will be run off in the 200 yards seniors. Stiff Sentence For Kissing Wife

Four Hundred Dollars or Six Months' Jail Handed to Loving Husband.

All husbands beware! All would-be husbands get wise! Four hundred dollars in sureties or six months in jail was the sentence meted out to a husband who attempted to kiss his wife in Ontario on Sunday evening. The case was taken up in the police court yesterday afternoon. But one witness gave evidence—the wife who wouldn't be kissed. The husband appeared in his own defence, but made no attempt to defend his actions. He thought it was quite proper to show such marks of affection to his lawful spouse.

The wife relied on her youth and beauty to support her argument; the husband on a burst of oratory that would have left even a Philadelphia lawyer gasping for breath. He had a "pretty" good case against him and lost out.

The Wife's Story

The wife said her husband stopped her on the street and wanted to talk with her. As she was carrying her own living she felt that she was entitled to her independence, and refused to listen to him. She started to go home and he took her by the arm and accompanied her.

Arrived at her destination where she was employed as a domestic, she phoned the police to have her husband removed from the premises.

While on their way her husband kissed her several times she said, and a couple of men made him stop. In reply to the magistrate she said that she had been married to her husband three years and they had one child. She was a soldier's widow, and had two children by her first husband. A year ago last March she left her second choice of a life mate.

She based her complaint on the fact that during their walk Sunday night her husband reminded her of a threat he had once made before, that if he caught her with any other man he would shoot her.

The defendant at this juncture put several questions to the complainant. She admitted to him that she had never while they were living as man and wife, placed a hand upon her, nor had she ever wanted for food or clothing. Although she alleged he had been cruel to her children, she admitted that the occasion had been one in which he had chastised them at her request.

The Husband's Defence

The husband then made a statement in his own defence. He said he had gone to ask his wife if she would not let bygones be bygones and live with him again. He loved her and he wanted to make a home for her and his child who claimed her as a mother.

While he was speaking the magistrate assumed a strictly impartial attitude, after warning him that he had only the present charge to consider. The wife argued at his story.

Placed with the loss of his wife with whom he was infatuated, and the prospect of a term in jail for this display of affection towards her, the defendant lost all control of himself. In a burst of vehement eloquence that swamped both the clerk and the scribes, he pleaded his cause. His oration lasted for over half an hour.

When he concluded, his wife's scornful laugh broke the silence of the court room, and then the verdict was pronounced. "Four hundred dollars in sureties or six months in jail."
