## St. John Women's Council Session

### Women's Institute Received in Re-affiliation - Numerous Reports Received.

The St. John Women's Institute was received in re-affiliation at yesterday's meeting of the St. John Council of Women. Members welcomed Mrs. E. Atherton Smith, the president, back after her absence from the Council meetings.

It was with regret that members heard of the death of Mrs. Nellie McCune, who was unable to attend. Mrs. Raymond was asked to look into the matter.

The resignation of Miss Etta Millikan as corresponding secretary was accepted. Appreciation of Miss Millikan's services and hopes for her speedy recovery from ill-health were expressed.

The sad case of a feeble-minded illegitimate child was reported by Mrs. E. Atherton Smith. Mrs. Smith pointed out the grave need for an institution where such cases could be cared for.

Mrs. David McLellan reported that "The Women's Century" has been dropped as the official publication of the Council. Mrs. W. Edmund Raymond stated that the Council proposed endorsing another publication.

Mrs. H. Milton Budd wrote asking that the Council endorse the appointment of Judge Emily Murphy as a member of the Senate. This appointment is urged by many women's organizations throughout the Dominion.

Miss Alice Estey reported a balance on hand of \$46.40 after the payment of \$11.56, bills outstanding.

Miss Leavitt reported on arrangements for a luncheon at Mrs. McCune's gift of boxes for collections from W. E. Raymond was accepted with thanks.

It was decided to ask the Mayor for permission to hold Rosebud Day on December 10th for the benefit of the Children's Aid.

A letter of regret at the departure of Mrs. J. H. Jenner will be sent on motion with best wishes for her future welfare.

Mrs. Poole, secretary, read an account of the National Council arranged by Mrs. W. Edmund Raymond, Mrs. William McAvity and Miss Anne Tingley.

Mrs. Hooper, having formally given notice of motion brought up the matter of the return of the top of the St. John Women's Institute. The Council had declared the Women's Institute an affiliated society. Mrs. Hooper read a letter sent to Mrs. Wilfrid Cummings in explanation of the affair. The letter stated that no institution can be declared out of existence except by the Provincial Minister of Agriculture. It was stated also that the president of the St. John Women's Institute is a member of the Council of the Federal Women's Institute of Canada and of the Provincial executive.

Mrs. E. Atherton Smith spoke in praise of the good accomplished by the Women's Institute throughout the province. They are always responsive.

## Why Women Should Vote For Meighen Women's Canadian Club Annual Meeting

### His Government Stands for Protection of Its Home Market—Nine Reasons in Favor.

The following nine reasons are excellent ones why women should vote for the National Liberal-Conservative party:

- 1.—Because the leader, the Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, is able, sincere, courageous and of irreproachable character.
- 2.—Because the National Liberal-Conservative party legislates for all the people of Canada without discrimination.
- 3.—Because at this time of abnormal conditions and unrest following the war, we need men of experience to guide the country through this difficult time. Mr. Meighen and most of his members brought Canada safely through the war and understand better than any and inexperienced men the difficulties and problems of Government.
- 4.—Because the National Government has managed the finances of the country with wonderful economy. Outside our actual war debt, of which every responsible Canadian is proud, the expenditure of the Meighen Government is only two per cent. more than the annual national expenditure of 10 years ago, despite greatly increased prices.
- 5.—Because the National Liberal and Conservative Party stands up for adequate protection and the building up of Canadian agriculture, Canadian industries, and Canadian labor, and for the manufacture in Canada by Canadian workmen of Canadian natural resources, and is unalterably opposed to free trade, or to such a lowering of our present tariff as would hand over the Canadian home market to the farmers and manufacturers and workmen to the United States and which, in the end, would mean the ultimate absorption of Canada by the United States.
- 6.—Because under a protective tariff Canadian agriculture has increased 30 fold and the total trade of Canada has increased 16 times since protection was adopted in 1878, and Canada is today one of the richest countries in the world per capita. Why destroy what we have built up? Why make experiments at the most critical, the most dangerous, time in our history?
- 7.—Canada cannot dare lower the already low tariff or adopt free trade because every other country in the world is protectionist and increasing their tariffs.
- 8.—Because Canada, without adequate protection of its home market, cannot compete with the cheap labor of the Orient or Western Europe, particularly Germany.
- 9.—Because it is vitally important to women that their fathers, husbands, sons and daughters should have steady work and good wages in Canada. Free trade or low tariff would close down our industries, deprive our workmen of their homes, rob our farmers of their home market, and bring ruin to Canada by flooding it with American products, produced by American farmers or American workmen, while our men and women would be walking the streets unemployed.

The Milk Fund Committee reported through Mrs. Tennant whose report was read by Mrs. Poole. The good accomplished in saving babies was described. Miss Cotes stated that thirty-two babies are being supplied and there is need for money for fifty babies. Up to date \$67.04 has been received and there is a balance on hand of \$28.54.

Miss Cotes of the Victorian Order told of the distribution of Free Milk Tickets. Owing to unemployment many families need assistance. Several widows and deserted wives are receiving help for their babies. The V. O. Nurses follow up cases closely. Mrs. Cotes stated that without the Milk Fund she did not see how these babies could have existed throughout the summer. No baby, a member of the Fund, has died. It is emphatically the work of the Victorian Order as their child welfare. A vote of thanks was passed to Miss Cotes, moved by Mrs. David McLellan, seconded by Mrs. E. L. Rising.

Some discussion regarding funds for the Milk Fund ensued and doubt was expressed as to whether the Council could continue to carry out this work. It was the general opinion that the Council should carry it on. Many suggestions were received. Milk cans will be placed in all public places. Mrs. A. C. D. Wilson, Mrs. W. Edmund Raymond and Mrs. Richard Hooper have definite plans for raising money. Mrs. H. B. Peck was elected corresponding secretary by acclamation.

Letters of regret will be sent to Mrs. Louis Green for a recent bereavement, as well as to Mrs. A. J. Mulcahy.

Mrs. Smith made feeling reference to the sympathy felt by all the Council for these members in their sorrow. A letter expressing sympathy for Mrs. J. Willard Smith in her anxiety over the illness of her daughters. Appreciation of the work of Mrs. Poole as recording secretary and acting corresponding secretary was expressed by a standing vote.

At the meeting \$42 were contributed to the Milk Fund.

Mrs. Raymond asked that a number of votes of thanks be sent for hospitality tendered National delegates. Reports of National Standing Committees were deferred until the next meeting of the Council.

The attendance was very large.

Mrs. Leonard Tilley told of the invitation of the Boston Women's Canadian Club for St. John members to avail themselves of the privileges of the Boston Club when visiting Boston. It was also announced that there are hopes of having Lady Byng as a guest of the Canadian Club.

She briefly outlined the origin and growth of Canadian Clubs. Sessions were held in the Parliament buildings with 150 delegates present. Ralph Connor opened the meeting with prayer. Premier Norris, Major Parnell and Major Newcomb, President of the Winnipeg Club, R. W. Craig, K. C. presided. Portions of the fine addresses given at the sessions were read all holding forth ideas of patriotism. There are now 89 Clubs federated. There is a Canadian Club in London, England which is flourishing. Hamilton, Ontario, the birthplace of Canadian Clubs, was chosen as the next place of meeting. President Oliver of the New York Canadian Club was an eloquent speaker. Praise to reverence November 11th, Armistice Day, were suggested.

The adoption of "Canadian" as a national term for vital statistics and legal papers was urged as well as a proper celebration of Dominion Day. Encouragement of good films and especially of British films was adopted. The Canadianization of Canada must be held first and foremost. A wreath was placed on the Winnipeg cenotaph to Winnipeg's heroes.
