London, Jan. 21. Consols 92 1/2; breadstuffs quiet. The steamer Thornaby, from Cardiff for Bombay, is reported to be lost at sea with 25 persons on board.

It is reported that the Emperor of China is in a critical condition. The rebellion in Uruguay was a complete success. General Almirante and his business is suspended at Montevideo. A British squadron is in the harbor. Pedro Varela is elected Provisional President.

Forty-seven Carlist electors have notified that they have given adhesion to King Alfonso. It is reported the Carlists are now enrolling youths of 17. The physicians announce to-day that Prince Leopold is worse. Canon Kingsley's condition is less favorable.

Many lives are reported to be lost by the floods in California, and several miners and their families in the mountains perished by snow slides.

(Special Telegram to the Tribune.) Common Carriers—Average Adjust. Municipal Taxes on Government Property—Burdens on Coasting Vessels—Officers Elected.

Ottawa, Jan. 21. The Dominion Board of Trade resumed business this morning, and passed a resolution in connection with the Common Carrier law, with regard to the carriers by land. The resolution recommended to Government to take measures to have an act passed similar to the Imperial Act now in force in Great Britain respecting carriers by water, the Acts containing similar provisions as those contained in the merchants Shipping Act for the delivery of goods by vessel from foreign ports and a lien for freight.

The Committee on Average Adjusters reported in favor of the Board of Trade in the principal parts of the Dominion having power to appoint Average Adjusters, and that they make all general adjustments in vessels and cargo consigned to such port unless otherwise agreed upon by the owners of cargo and the owners of vessels.

Mr. Thomson, in Laidie vs. Vernon after recess yesterday, moved to amend his notices of defence, making the third count applicable to the whole declaration, and adding notice setting forth that the defendant had a right to enter the house of Jeremiah Brundage, and that the injury was caused in a certain measure by the negligence of the plaintiff. Mr. Kerr was granted time to consider, and the Court adjourned till to-morrow.

This forenoon the counsel argued the motion. Judge Wetmore suggested that the alterations be allowed, subject to the objections of the Court above. Any defence made under the new allegation would be put specially to the jury, and should not endanger the case under the old counts. He gave the counsel until after recess to decide if they would accept the proposition.
