J. M. FLEWELLING DIES AT MONTREAL

M. L. A. for St. Stephen Passed Away After Undergoing Operations.

St. Stephen, N. B., Nov. 1.—John Medley Flewelling, member-elect of the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick, died yesterday at the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal, where a few days ago he underwent an operation. He had been ill for several months and had been to Montreal for treatment a few months ago.

The community was greatly shocked at the news that Mr. Flewelling had passed away at 6 o'clock. Only in the noon mail had come letters to relatives and friends here stating that the operation, the second he underwent during his illness, had been thought to be successful and everything looked brighter than before for his recovery.

About 4 o'clock a telegram came for his sister, Miss Jean Flewelling. R. N. stating that he was critically ill and asking her to go to Montreal. She and her brother Emery left on last night's Montreal train, but did not reach there in time. Mrs. Flewelling had accompanied her husband to Montreal and was with him at the time of his death.

John Medley Flewelling was born at Woodstock, N. B., June 28, 1879, a son of Rev. J. E. and Mrs. Flewelling. He was educated at Centreville, N. B. and in June, 1908, was married to Sarah J. McVay, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph McVay, of this town. Mr. Flewelling came here about sixteen years ago and went into the insurance, real estate and brokerage business, in which, with his genial personality and his ability, he worked up a large business.

In 1920 he was elected to the Legislative Assembly as one of the conservative representatives for Charlotte. Again on Aug. 19, 1925, he was elected, although sickness prevented him from campaigning or taking any part in the election. He scored a large majority and was elected to represent the new constituency of St. Stephen-Milltown.

Mr. Flewelling was a man ever looking after the interests of his town and county, always putting the interests of others ahead of himself. He was a great giver to all deserving objects and this town and county has lost one of its best citizens. He scored a large majority and was elected to represent the new constituency of St. Stephen-Milltown.

He was a past president of the St. Stephen-Milltown Rotary Club, a member of the Masonic lodge and of the St. Andrew's Society, a director of the St. Stephen Agricultural Society and a member of the Fredericton City Club and other societies. Besides his wife, he leaves one daughter, Jean, two young sons, Joseph and John, his father, Rev. J. E. Flewelling and several brothers and sisters. Miss Jean Flewelling, R. N. of this town, is a sister, and Sterling, of Dufferin, is a brother. Emery, another brother from the west, is also here, having come last week to see his brother. The body will arrive at St. Stephen tomorrow noon. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

RIVERSIDE CHURCH BURNED TO GROUND

Hopewell Hill, N. B., Nov. 1.—The former Presbyterian church at Riverside, lately under the United Church body, was burned to the ground between 6 and 7 o'clock on Saturday evening. The Catholic rectory and the residence of Adelbert Wilbur on opposite sides of the church were, in grave danger but were saved by the fire-fighters. The Wilbur house was badly scorched. Had there been a high wind from the west or north a large section of the village would in all probability have been wiped out.

CANADIAN FAILURES.

Toronto, Oct. 31.—Fifty two commercial failures were reported in the Dominion and Newfoundland during the week ended yesterday, compared with 39 during the corresponding week of last year, according to R. G. Dun's report to-day. By provinces they are: Ontario 10; Quebec 20; Manitoba 5; British Columbia 6; Saskatchewan 3; Alberta 2 and two in Newfoundland.

CENTENARIAN VOTER.

AIRPLANE FATALITIES.

Copenhagen, Nov. 2.—A new Fokker airplane on its first flight yesterday crashed at the Kastrup Airdrome. The pilot and three passengers were killed. Two other passengers were gravely injured.

Woodstock, N. B., Nov. 1.—Fire Saturday destroyed the barn and stables of R. E. Hamilton. Starting in the office maintained at the rear of the stable, the fire had gained a good start before the blaze was discovered by the caretaker. Four highly bred race horses, owned by Fred Cameron, Fredericton, Wilnot Robertson, Upper Woodstock, and Mr. Hamilton, and valued at \$4,000, were saved. The loss was estimated at \$3,500, covered by insurance.

ST. JOHN BUILDING GUTTED BY FIRE

St. John, N. B., Nov. 2.—Damage to the extent of about \$5,500 was caused shortly after Saturday midnight by a fire which broke out in the two cells adjoining the large four-story building 151-157 Union-street. The building is owned by J. L. McAvity, and the occupants are D. J. Barrett, a dealer in stoves and metal work, and F. J. Cameron, tailor, on the ground floor. Mrs. Julia McAuley and Mrs. J. Sanderson conduct a rooming apartment on the second floor, while the third and fourth floors are occupied by Thomas Frautin as a lodging apartment.

The damage to the building is estimated at about \$3,000, and is covered by insurance. Mr. Barrett carries \$4,000 insurance and his loss is estimated at about \$1,500.

The loss to the furniture of Mrs. McAuley and Mr. Frautin amounts to a total of about \$1,000 and is only partially covered by insurance.
