NEW SURRENDER DOUBLES FORMER FIGURE

More Money for Rights

Indians of the Carlyle reserve have finally made their peace with the white man.

For some years "peaceful trouble" has reigned on the reserve as the Indians considered what they described as the trickery of the white men who controlled the town of Carlyle and the adjacent summer resort. The town had negotiated a surrender of the lake and land by the Indians for a term of 99 years for the sum of \$400.

Today's Indians, more educated and better versed in business decided the sum paid was too small and have for some years battled over the matter. All was settled

Friday and Saturday of last week when, under the direction of W. Murison, head of Indian affairs for Saskatchewan, a band meeting was held and a new surrender drawn up and completed.

New arrangements deal with a 25-year lease instead of one for 99 years. The Indians are to receive \$800 a year for the 25 years and after the first five under the agreements, they will receive an additional 10 per cent. on all rentals and concessions. The two leases include the one for the former region and an additional lease for 200 acres on the west shore of the lake near No. 9 highway.

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
