LUMBERING INDUSTRY ON CAMPOBELLO

For two months the sound of axe and saw has been heard on Campobello Island and lumbering on a large scale has been inaugurated within its limits. W. B. Mason, of Lubec, Me., who was in the city yesterday, a guest at the Dufferin, told The Telegraph that the splendid timber on the island was at last being garnered in by the advancing step of civilization.

The island was formerly the property of a lady in New York, he said, but it had been sold to an American syndicate, and there are rumors afloat that this syndicate is, in turn, connected in some way with the Great Northern pulp interests.

Mr. Mason said that a mill was to be erected on the centre of the island, and one on either side, and that the logs would be cut up on the ground. Although no doubt large quantities of shooks would be turned out, the reports in lumbering circles, he said, would indicate that long timber would be made.

The forests of the island, for the most part, are of black spruce and the trees are of good size. For years the island of Campobello has stood almost challenging the lumbermen and many large operators have looked upon it with envious eyes. However, the offensive at last took shape and the outlook is that Campobello island will be of the bald-headed variety before long.

Mr. Mason said that the lumbermen at work on the island estimate that there is five years' continuous cutting on Campobello and some of very fine quality. Considerable interest is taken in lumbering circles in the activities in this line on Campobello.—St. John Telegraph, Jan. 1.
