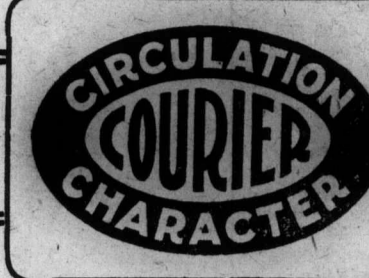

### STONOPHIS OF CANADIAN HOUSE WEST LAND NEGOTIATIONS The sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war and since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Details—Six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years. In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead patent and cultivating a month of each of three years. Pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions. Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada against a full residence duty, under certain conditions. When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged may obtain pre-emption in applying for entry at local Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agent).
