There wass a splendid Saturday market on the square, Strawberries were in the greatest quantity but they sold rapidly. Everybody seemed to want strawberries, and they got them. The price this year has been better than usual, owing probably, to the smaller acreage planted. The quality of the fruit, however, has been excellent. The price ranged from five to seven cents, according to the size of the

There was a splendid offering of all the products of the garden. Green peas, shelled, sold at 15 cents a quart, potatoes 6c a quart, lettuce from one to two cents a head, radishes two for 5c., beets, three bunches for 10 cents, asparagus, three bunches for 10 cents, and onions two for 5 cents.

Cherries have made their appearance. They were all of the English variety, and sold at from 5 to 84 per

Gooseberries were offered at 5c quart. ... In the shed there was a scarcity of butter and eggs, and the attendance was light. Eggs were higher at 12c. a dozen, and the egg buyers were quite conspicuous by their absence from the market. Butter sold at 14 to 15 cents a pound, chickens at 25 to 30c and

spring chickens at 20c. each. Fisherman Murphy, from Shrews-bury, reported the catch of fish this week at Lake Erie as light. Blue pickerel sold at 25c. a dozen, and perch at 20c. a dozen. Mr. Bunning had salmon trout at 10 cents a pound and one of these was a monster, weighing 30
