THE NEW CHAPEL.

Sisters of the Ursuline Convent Have a Very Handsome

Office—Fine Stained Windows.

Brief Description of the Sacred

Edifice—Fine Stained Windows.

The sisters of the Ursuline Convent decided a little over a year ago to erect a chapel for their use. In the spring the corner stone was laid by Bishop McEvoy. Yesterday those who attended the dedication ceremonies were ushered into one of the prettiest little chapels in Ontario. In honor of the occasion the building was draped in the colors of the papal delegate and the altar was adorned with nature's own handiwork flowers and foliage. The exterior of the building is of brick, the interior is finished in polished oak throughout. The altar and sanctuary are handsomely furnished and on one side of the altar is a life sized image of St. Joseph holding the infant Christ and on the other an image of the virgin mother.

The stained glass windows are works of art. In the glass are shown pictures of the Holy Family, St. Angela, St. Ursula, St. Anne, St. John the Baptist. These windows are some memorials of the others gift windows. The donors are, M. A. Croly, Rev. A. McKee, Miss Louise, Fessard, Buffalo; Mrs. B. Bury, Mrs. J. Brothers, and the pupils of 1900, who donated two windows. The other windows are in memory of Dr. T. J. Guy and Ida and Alice Brothers.

The chapel cost nearly \$12,000 and at the entrance door is a large marble tablet on which is engraved the names of all who contributed to the building. There are about 200 names on the tablet.

At the feet of the statue of Christ, is a large golden altar which is the center of the twenty heaviest contributors to the chapel. The first three names are Bishop McEvoy, Father Francis, Solanus and Mother Mary. The statue of the chapel are of polished oak and there is accommodation for about 150 pupils. The sisters have their seats along either wall. The choir loft is at the rear. The completed church, through its diminutive size, is complete in all its appointments.

THE OYSTER CRAB.

A Network of Curious Stories Have

The little crab about the size of a pea, resembling a bleached out spider, is the oyster crab. In Europe it is called the pea crab and is decidedly scarce, rarely seen except by naturalists. It is common on our coasts, not only in oysters, but also in mussels and scallops.

Washington crab is a name that has been suggested for it, as it was considered a great delicacy by our first president, says The Scientific American. The oyster crab has been known from the earliest history, and a curious network of stories have been woven about it.

Aristotle the Greek and Pliny the Roman naturalists, believed that a definite relation or understanding existed between the shellfish and its lodger and even went so far as to say that death would be the result if the crab should desert its host. The watchful oyster, living within the home of the dull and stupid oyster, on seeing small fish approach, would wait until one more bold than the rest of his companions ventured within the open shell; then, gently nipping the oyster, he would be close within the fish and the host and his guest, would feed at leisure upon the body of the venturesome fish.

Another story, which held its own until late in the last century, was that this little crab played the part of the "king's jacks," who hunted by night for his majesty the lion. It would slay forth to the oyster and bring food to the helpless monarch or oyster and on returning from the hunt, should it find the house closed, would give a cry, which was recognized by the host, the door instantly opened, and it was allowed to enter. Study has shown that the crab never leaves its home and cannot cry, but as for the lion, who, in fact, often gets the food for the jacks, so it is that the little crab feeds upon the substances which are swept in by the current of water made by the bivalve in order to bring its own food and to freshen the water for its respiration.

Again, the crab was said to wara its protecting host from danger by a timely pinch, so that the doors could be closed against some crafty octopus or insidious starfish, and for which service the crab was rewarded by board and lodging.

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
