One day she kept at him until he said: "All right, mother. Whatever you tell me to do the rest of the day I'll do."

A couple of hours later Mr. and Mrs. Greeley and Mr. and Mrs. Hasbrouck were getting into the rowboat for their usual daily trip to Iona Island. Mrs. Greeley stepped in first, sat down and placed her parasol with the handle resting on the seat and the other end on the water. Mr. Greeley, who was waiting to get into the boat, she called out:
