HORSEBACK RIDING
AS EXERCISE

Horseback riding is very fashion-
able in this country, and is becoming
more and more popular as a means of
exercise. But, although many physi-
cians advise it, few women have ac-
customed themselves to the idea of
riding astride, although in Europe it
is in more or less vogue. However,
now that the custom has been taken
up by the English royal family,
and to some extent by fashionable
people in the European capitals, Amer-
ican women are pretty sure to fol-
low their lead before long.

Paris has not taken the fad at all
seriously, but Frenchwomen are not
the horseback riders that the Eng-
lish, Irish, German, Austrian and
Russian women are. Dublin has
fought a bit shy of the custom, but
women in St. Petersburg, and to a
lesser extent in Moscow, and largely
in Warsaw and Budapest, have taken
kindly to the innovation. And it is
women of fashion, and not actresses
seeking newspaper notoriety, who
have pioneered the side saddle worth
abandoning for the cross seat.

Princess Victoria of Wales, grand-
daughter of King Edward, rides
astride entirely, and with the ap-
proval of her royal grandmother. The
princess wears a riding habit, a cos-
tume of light skirt and a double

neatly on both sides the horse when
she is mounted. Other little ones
have followed her example, of course,
and older girls and even matrons
have been seen in numbers on Rotten
Row and in the hunting fields. It is
pretty certain that the divided skirt
will be at Quorn and other fashionable
centres this coming fall, and natu-
rally American women who have been
abroad this season and seen the
growth of fashion will not be long
in following suit here.—Denver Times.

THE WELFARE
MANAGER

Within the last few years there has
been created in the industrial world
an office now known as that of the
welfare manager. It should not be
forgotten, however, that this term
was invented to fit an office already
in existence, and that it was not so
invented until much valuable work
of a similar character had been ac-
complished.

This manager, who may be either a
man or a woman, is a recognized
intermediary between the employers
and employees of mercantile houses
and manufacturing plants which pos-
sess any pretensions to size and im-
portance. Such a person represents
the choice of an employer who would
introduce among his employees im-
proved and more favorable condi-
tions, but who, hampered as he is by
the complex ramifications of the in-
dustrial and social world of to-day, and
unable to attend personally to every
detail, finds himself obliged to sum-
mon to his aid the services of an
intermediary between himself and
those in his employ.

It is the employer, not the employee,
who has chosen this intermediary and
outlined the scope of the manager's
work. At the same time, it is true
that his own purposes may not be
defeated by the presence of too much
friction in his establishment, he has
been at pains, when making his
choice, to respect the sentiments and
prejudices, and sometimes even the
dignities, of his employees. In no
case coming under the observation
has he failed to remove a welfare
manager unable to preserve the har-
monies. For such a manager, it must
be understood, is unlike a superin-
tendent or a foreman, and has no
direct authority in the business, nor
power to engage or to dismiss an
employee.—The Century.

A HORSE HOSPITAL.
