THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The Third Day of Session
was a Very Busy
One

A PLEASANT BANQUET

Special Correspondence.

London, June 8.—Much business was transacted on the third day of the General Assembly.

The report of Manitoba College was presented by Dr. Patrick, the principal, and while the number of men in the theological classes was not large the classes in Arts were well attended. This, the youngest of the colleges, was commended to the liberality of the church at large. It was pointed out by some of the Western men that the time had almost come for the establishment of another college in the farther west, in the regions of the Rockies.

A deputation from the Anglican Synod was introduced in the afternoon, and the address of His Lordship Bishop Williams and the reply of Principal Gordon of Queen's, were the features of the Assembly thus far. The statement by the Bishop that the Anglican Church will enter seriously into the discussion of church unity and the sentiment of the Assembly in return promises to develop a new phase of the much discussed question of Church union.

The report on statistics by Rev. Dr. Torrence was presented, showing a splendid increase for the year in membership, and in contributions for religious purposes.

At six o'clock the graduates of Knox College were entertained to lunch by the ladies of the First Church. The attendance was very large and as the proposed removal of the College was discussed, more enthusiasm was predicted than at any gathering in half of old Knox for many years. The speakers at the banquet were Mr. J. K. Macdonald, of the Confederation Life Association, Toronto, Rev. A. H. MacGillivray, of the First Church, Chatham, Rev. R. J. Willson, of Vancouver, Dr. Grant, of Orillia, Rev. J. McD. Duncan, of Toronto, and Rev. J. A. McDonald, of the Glee. The words of the last named, "Knox must be moved, and we are the men to do it," gives the key note of this splendid banquet.

Friday was another great night, being given over to Home's Mission, for this work is second only to the work in the homeland. The church is exceedingly fortunate in the men who are home on furlough. To hear the venerable Dr. Annan of the New Hebrides tell the work among the cannibals, Mr. Coffin tell of the educational work in Trinidad; Mr. Taylor on the wonderful revival in India, Mr. Griffith on the awakening of China, and Mr. M
