THE OPENING OF SCHOOLS

The Maple City Scholars And Teachers Are Again At Work

THE LOCAL CONDITIONS

The Central school re-opened to-day, and hundreds of little boys and little girls realized with wistful sighs that the summer holidays were over, and that they must get down to earnest work once more—one of the earlier lessons that there must come an end to all pleasure, and that life is not altogether a perpetual summer vacation.

From 8.30 till 9 o'clock the sidewalks echoed with the patter of many little feet, and the streets were filled with sunburned lads and lassies who are going to study harder than ever now. For every "shining morning face" turned up early this morning, and no one was late the first day of school. When they arrived they found Principal Plesch and his efficient staff there to welcome them to greater endeavor.

Everything was found to be in readiness for the scholars, and the work of renovation had been rushed that it might be so. There was a record attendance.

The inside appearance of the school this morning was very bright and cheerful. The rooms all looked clean and sweet. They have been painted with regard to light and situation, in suitable shades. The prevailing colors on the ceilings is green, and the walls are in browns, fawns and olive green. The portions of the school not yet supplied with metal ceilings have been tastefully decorated in alabaster tints.

Every teacher was present and Miss A. McKinnon, of Glencoe, arrived this morning to take the vacant position. Miss McKinnon was a member of the same Model class as Misses Birch and Leak, who also began their duties this morning. Nearly all the teachers are at new work as the result of the many changes on the staff. There have been sixteen changes to the Central school staff in three years.

Misses Mescham, Blackburn and Cummings entered the kindergarten to train under Miss Green. The

pupils were dismissed at eleven and will re-assemble at nine to-morrow.

The Model school assembled at two o'clock this afternoon.

The McKeough school was not opened this morning on account of the fact that the renovations are not yet completed.

The Collegiate Institute opened with a record attendance this morning—312—the largest yet for opening day in the history of the school. This number will be greatly increased in a day or so. Indications point to a crowded condition of the institution before long, and the trustees concede that some provision will have to be made for greater accommodation.

The Collegiate has undergone a thorough cleaning and renovation during the holidays, and everything looked spick and span this morning.

A committee from the C. C. I. Harington and Lidley were present to witness the re-opening.

MUNICIPAL INQUIRY

Dover Council Authorize Judge Bell To Look Into Charges

THE ALLEGED GRAFTING

The Reeve of the Township of Dover informs us that at the adjourned meeting of the Dover Council held yesterday it was decided to bring on an investigation of the charges contained in the Wallaceburg Herald-Record under the heading "Dover Municipal Printing Graft" before the County Judge. In view of the fact that the charges were directed more particularly against the Clerk, the Council, following the advice of their solicitor, delayed taking definite action at once in order to give the Clerk an opportunity to take any action which he might be advised to take by his solicitor and to give him a free hand in that respect before taking the matter up on behalf of the Council. The Clerk obtained affidavits from the local printers which were published last week denying that there was any graft in the municipal printing. This, however, does not, in the opinion of the Council, dispose of the whole matter, and the Council are determined that the whole matter of the charges shall be investigated thoroughly before the County Judge. The Reeve says that if there has been anything crooked going on he has not known anything about it, and he believes that the other members of the Council did not know of it, and every opportunity will be given to the proprietor of the Herald-Record to make good his charges and to produce the document which he claims to have over the signature of the Clerk and to show under what circumstances he obtained them.

The matter is now in the hands of Judge Bell and will be proceeded with just as quickly as the Judge can arrange to take it up.

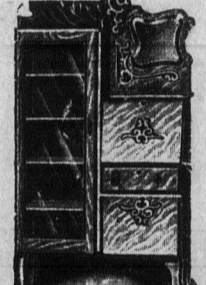
