GOVERNMENT INQUIRY

Into York County Loan Co.'s
 Affairs Begins Tuesday.

York County Loan Manager Before the
 Court Refuse — President Phillips
 Wants More Time and Gets Till
 Friday, Jan. 5—Liquidator Presents
 a Statement of the Sinks Already
 Taken—What the Assets Are.

Toronto, Dec. 21.—The Ontario Gov-
 ernment is going on with its enquiry
 into the York County Loan affairs
 without delay.

Yesterday W. H. Cross, the examiner
 appointed by Hon. J. J. Fox, began to
 issue subpoenas for various persons
 who are conversant with the doings of
 the alleged company.

On Tuesday, Manager Phillips will
 be examined.

Mr. Matheson of Matheson, Starr &
 Spencer, has been retained by Mr.
 Cross to assist.

The examination of Mr. Joseph
 Phillips, manager of the York County
 Loan, was commenced yesterday morn-
 ing before the referee, Mr. Neil Mc-
 Lean. The evidence adduced concerned
 preliminary matters and Mr. Phillips
 was given a number of matters on which
 to inform himself in order to be able
 to answer questions fully on Jan. 5,
 when the next session opens.

His idea of duty.

Mr. C. D. Scott, at the opening of
 the court explained that he appeared
 in behalf of the liquidators and said
 that they would not consider their duty
 fulfilled until they had obtained the
 fullest possible knowledge of the assets,
 liabilities and doings of the company's
 officers and directors with the share-
 holders, creditors and all the debts and
 assets of the company, and the dis-
 posal that may have been made of the
 assets of the company.

He said that he should turn out that
 there had been any wrongful disposi-
 tion of the assets rightfully belonging
 to the shareholders. The liquidators
 would ask the court to intervene to
 assist in the recovery of them for the
 shareholders. The liquidators expected
 the officers of the company to give a
 frank explanation of the state of the
 company, and to answer all questions
 explicitly.

Manitoba's interests.

Hon. Colin H. Campbell, Attorney-
 General of Manitoba had a conference
 with Hon. J. J. Fox before him the views
 of the Winnipeg shareholders who are
 opposed to the litigation proceeding
 before the Ontario Government investi-
 gation has been concluded.

Liquidator's Initial Report.

Mr. Scott read the official statement
 from the National Trust Co.:
 The liquidator begs to report to the
 court that he has so far taken in the
 administration of the estate.

From the books of the company the
 assets appear to be mainly as follows:

(a) Mortgage.
 There are a large number of loans
 on the books of two classes:
 (a) Upon properties sold by the
 company and given back as part of the
 purchase price.
 (b) Loans made to members and se-
 cured by mortgages on real estate.
 These loans are distributed over the
 whole province.

Principal Assets.

The principal assets of the estate
 may be divided into three classes:
 (a) House properties.
 Notice of the mortgage given to tenants
 to pay their rent at this office and the
 insurance companies have been notified
 of the change of interest.

(b) Factory premises on Sorauren
 avenue.

The building is rented and appar-
 ently is advantageously situated.

(c) Vacant land.

The company owns a great bulk of
 the vacant land on both sides
 of the main highway between Ronces-
 valles avenue and Dundas and west
 of Roncesvalles avenue between Queen
 street and Howard avenue.

Securities Taken by Liquidator.

The following securities of this na-
 ture have been taken over by the
 liquidator:

1. 180 shares of the capital stock of
 the Toronto Life Insurance Co. of the
 par value of \$100 each.

2. \$121,500 par value of bonds of the
 Southern Light & Power Co.

3. The liquidator is making careful en-
 quires as to the position of these com-
 panies and the value of the securities
 and will, at the earliest moment, re-
 port to the court.

5. Loans to shareholders secured by
 assignments of stock.

Apparently loans were not made in
 excess of fifty per cent. of the amount
 paid in by the borrowing shareholders.

6. Money due by collectors.

The liquidator has notified all col-
 lectors to send in the balance of their
 accounts to the date of liquidation. It
 will probably be some weeks before these
 accounts are finally adjusted.

7. Bank balances.

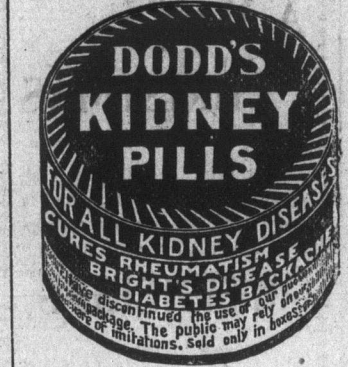
All balances to the credit of the com-
 pany at the various agencies are
 being forwarded to the Toronto office
 of the company's bank and an accu-
 rate statement of the total bank bal-
 ance will be shortly available.

The liquidator took over from the
 company's manager the sum of \$18,000
 on hand.

The company's liabilities to the pub-
 lic are of no considerable
 amount and will not probably be de-
 finitely ascertained until the ordinary
 advertisement for creditors has run its
 course.

Struck by Train; Will Live.
 Ottawa, Dec. 21.—Struck by a train
 near Stittsville, Wesley Featherstone,
 a farmer of that locality, had a narrow
 escape from death. He was walking
 across the track and did not notice
 the Brockville train, which was coming
 east. The man was struck but was
 thrown aside in place of going under
 the locomotive. He was rendered un-
 conscious, but is expected to recover.

Falls Through Trap Door.
 Brockville, Dec. 1.—Mrs. Surtell, a
 wealthy resident of Newport, while
 working in a store at Delta Tuesday
 stepped into a trap door opening and
 fell several feet, fracturing her skull.
 Her recovery is doubtful.

ABERDEEN COUNCIL IS FIRM.
 Refuses to Rescind Resolution on Em-
 broidered Pieces.

London, Dec. 21.—(C. A. P.)—By a
 majority of 21 to 13, the Aberdeen
 County Council has refused to rescind
 a resolution passed by the Council in
 October, 1901, requesting the amend-
 ment of the Cattle Diseases Act, by
 which Canadian cattle were barred.

John Marr, in moving the resolution,
 said that though it might not be true
 pleuro-pneumonia had been imported
 with Canadian cattle, there were other
 very dangerous diseases among
 Canadian stock, such as cattle mangle,
 the dealing with which was costing the
 Canadian Government a large sum of
 money.

EMBROIDERED PIECES.

How They Should Be Laundered to
 Get the Best Results.

An embroidered piece should never
 be put in with the regular wash. Let
 it be washed by itself in an earthen
 bowl. Take fairly hot water and make
 a light suds of some kind of pure soap.
 Wash quickly. If the linen is soiled
 rub that portion between the hands,
 but avoid general rubbing. Take it out
 of the suds and rinse thoroughly in
 clean water. Having thoroughly wash-
 ed the article, commence to dry it.

A wet piece of embroidery should
 never be hung up to dry, never be fold-
 ed upon itself and thrown in a heap,
 never left a moment while attending to
 something else. Lay the piece flat be-
 tween two dry towels or thick linen
 cloths and roll it up inside these in
 such a way that no part of the em-
 broidery can touch any other part of
 the same linen. In this shape it can be
 wrung or twisted without danger or
 can be lightly pounded, that the dry
 linen may the more quickly absorb the
 moisture. In this condition it should
 be left until the silks are dry.

Then the piece, face down upon an
 ironing board, well covered with sev-
 eral pieces of material. Spread a clean
 white cloth over the embroidery and
 iron lightly the whole surface, being
 careful not to press too heavily upon
 the embroidered portions. A hot iron
 placed upon embroideries that are wet
 will produce a steam that will injure
 the silk. Do not press hard at first,
 but work rapidly. Should the center
 have become too dry use a dampened
 cloth to run the iron over, as this meth-
 od will leave the linen sufficiently
 damp for pressing. It also leaves the
 linen fresh and holds the natural stiff-
 ness of same. Damp linen, dry silks,
 heat in iron and quick movement are
 the elements necessary to success.

HANDY SIDEBOARD.
