Town Council.
The regular monthly meeting of the Council was held on Wednesday evening, with Mayor Chambers and Councillors Hales, Regan, Haycock and Harris present.
The Streets Committee reported with regard to construction work. One thousand square yards from Westwood avenue had been completed and 2000 square yards from Earncliffe avenue to Cherry avenue is now ready for the first coat of Tarvia. A quantity of stone had been procured from Torbrook which was of good quality and cost no more than that manufactured here.
The Water Committee reported respecting work done during the month. A large amount of waste material had been cleared away from the dam and vicinity. A number of leaks were discovered which should be repaired before winter. The old screens at the reservoir were replaced by new ones and a few more iron boxes have been set in the west end of the town.
The Finance Committee reported receipts during July \$3978.23 with expenditure for same period \$3268.65. The debit balance at the end of July was \$353.07.
A communication was read from Mr. E. E. Archibald calling attention to the bad condition of the bridge crossing brook at junction of Main street and Earncliffe avenue. Mr. Archibald also wrote the Council at some length concerning water supply on Earncliffe avenue.
Policeman Crowell reported a number of pigs kept within the prescribed area.
The clerk was instructed to write Mr. E. E. Archibald with regard to water supply, and also that bridge referred to in his letter would be looked after.
The clerk was instructed to serve the parties violating by-laws with regard to pigs with copies of same pending other action.
