Editorial Jottings.

American investments in Canada during the first nine months of 1919 show an increase of about \$200,000,000. The greater part of the money was put into municipal securities.

The development of the motor industry in Canada this year is attracting attention, and several cities in Ontario are enjoying boons of greater or less dimensions as a result. An object in the new developments is, to achieve the construction of motor cars to the extent of 60 per cent. or more in value in this country, upon which they would be entitled to the preferential tariff in entering Great Britain.

The vocational act passed by the New Brunswick Legislature in 1918, which will widen the scope of the educational system of the province, will become effective in the school work of the present year. The act is administered by a vocational education board composed of nine members. Five of these will represent labor, farming, manufacturing and commerce. The other four will be the superintendent of education, the principal of the Normal School, the Deputy Minister of Agriculture and the director of Agricultural education.

Members of the House of Commons, who were opposed to the passage of the "Conditional Prohibition" law, declare that the Act will be attacked in the courts the first time it is invoked. These point out that the Act was passed on Sunday, and declare that the Lord's Day Act, until that statute is repealed, is binding on Parliament, as on other elements of the community. They point to the rules of the House to show that Sunday sittings are irregular and further, falling back on precedent, claim that such a course was never followed before by the Canadian Parliament. Even during the famous naval debate, a Sabbath truce was called. The bill in question was put through the House of Commons shortly before 1 o'clock on Sunday morning.

The employment of airships as sanatoria for the treatment of tuberculosis and other diseases is advocated by a doctor who was attached to the British air force during the war. The patients, it is pointed out, would be able to live for several days or even weeks at a height of about five thousand feet, enjoying complete rest and breathing air as pure and invigorating as that of any of the famous mountain resorts which only the rich can afford to visit. The big airships built by England for war purposes, the doctor says, can be fitted up as sanatoria for patients suffering from consumption, anaemia, neurasthenia and other ills, and except in very bad weather, can cruise about for weeks at a time.

The Airdrome at Ciampino, near Rome, is busy building a new dirigible destined to cross the Atlantic ocean. The airship, it is said, will be capable of travelling 3,125 miles without refueling. The airship will be able to accomodate 150 passengers.

Joseph L. Eaton, of Pictou Landing, has been appointed manager of the town of Pictou at a salary of \$2,000 a year. Pictou is the first town in the province to adopt the town manager form of government.
